Introduction

The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), in cooperation with the National Indian Gaming Commission (NIGC) and the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), has released a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the proposed Shiloh Resort and Casino Project by the Koi Nation of Northern California. This report aims to analyze the potential negative consequences outlined in the DEIS.

Arguments against the proposed project:

Land Resources

Developing a casino resort on the 68.6-acre site near Windsor, Sonoma County, California, involves significant land alteration. The transformation from its current state to a developed resort can lead to habitat destruction, soil erosion, and changes in land use patterns. The construction activities might disrupt the local flora and fauna, leading to long-term ecological impacts.

Water Resources

The project may significantly affect local water resources. Increased water demand for the resort, including the casino, hotel, spa, and other facilities, can strain existing water supplies. Biological Resources

The proposed site is home to various plant and animal species. The development could lead to habitat loss and fragmentation, threatening local biodiversity. Special attention is needed to protect any endangered or threatened species that might inhabit the area. The DEIS should provide detailed mitigation plans to minimize these impacts.

Cultural and Paleontological Resources

It is crucial to conduct thorough surveys and involve local indigenous groups to protect and preserve these valuable resources.

The increased demand for public services and utilities, such as water supply, wastewater treatment, and emergency services, can strain existing infrastructure. Socioeconomics

While the project may create jobs and stimulate economic growth, it might also lead to increased living costs and potential displacement of lower-income residents. The social dynamics of the community could change, leading to potential conflicts and inequalities.

Environmental Justice

The DEIS should evaluate whether the project disproportionately affects minority and low-income populations. Ensuring environmental justice requires that the benefits and burdens of the project are equitably distributed.

Visual Resources

The construction of a large resort complex will alter the visual landscape of the area, potentially detracting from the natural beauty and rural character of the region. This change might affect local tourism and the aesthetic value of the community.

Cumulative, Indirect, and Growth-Inducing Effects

The cumulative impact of the resort, when combined with other ongoing and future projects, could exacerbate environmental degradation. Indirect effects, such as increased development pressure in the surrounding areas, should be thoroughly assessed to understand the broader implications of the project.

Conclusion

The DEIS for the Shiloh Resort and Casino Project highlights several potential negative consequences that need careful consideration and mitigation. Addressing these issues through comprehensive planning and community engagement is essential to minimize adverse environmental and social impacts, ensuring sustainable development that benefits the Koi Nation and the broader community.

My husband and I have lived in Windsor since 1988 and have been pleased with the way our town has improved and grown since we moved in. The proposed Casino will be the largest in Northern California and will increase traffic and congestion in our area.

In 2019, we had to evacuate our town due to the Kincade Fire heading towards it. By Evacuating, our town was saved by the fire crews taking a stand. We had time for evacuation unlike many other towns that have been consumed by fires, but it took hours for an orderly evacuation because there are 2 main evacuation routes: US 101 and Old Redwood Highway. Since that evacuation, several low cost housing large apartment buildings have been added along Old Redwood Hwy near the proposed site and there will be many more residents to evacuate. If the Casino has to be evacuated that would add to traffic jams and possibly cost lives.

We have complied with water restrictions during several drought years. The casino will have to drill wells which will lower the water table. We conserve water in our home, but visitors to the Casino and Hotel will not restrict their water use.

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My wife and I have lived at 6500 Faught Rd., Santa Rosa, CA since September, 1977 (46 years).

Here are our objections to the Koi Nation Shiloh Resort and Casino:

- This development will have a significant impact on traffic on all the surrounding roads. People avoiding the congestion will spill onto our narrow winding country road (Faught Rd.). It is not designed for that.
- 2. Fire danger. This development is in the path of the last 2 fires, Tubbs and Kinkade. The vineyard is supposed to be a fire break. The development will be fuel for the next big fire.
- 3. We live in the country and have 2 wells on our property. Until the drought, we had no problems. In the last 5 years one well went dry and the 2nd is marginal. We do not irrigate our landscaping anymore and keep our fountain dry. If the Koi Nation builds the development they will draw down the water table more. I will have to drill an expensive deep well. The very least they should do is to get their water from the Town of Windsor or the County of Sonoma so that they live with the same rules others do.
- 4. This location is not near the Koi Nation's home. That is 48 miles away in Lake County. No other tribe has built a development farther than 15 miles from their home. This is a terrible precedent to set.
- 5. Sam Salmon, former mayor of Windsor and now on the town council, suggested that the suitable land for this development was on the vacant land south of Home Depot on the south side of Shiloh Rd. Easy access, wide road and just off Hwy 101. Not this location far from the freeway and through residential development.

Do not let this development proceed. There are too many issues with the impact of it. Again a terrible precedent to set.

Dr. Mr. Broussard and the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) decision makers,

We have been residents of the Town of Windsor for over 25 years, residing within a ½ mile from Koi Nation's proposed resort and casino project site.

The community, neighbors, businesses, and government officials at the local, state, and federal level, have <u>all opposed</u>the Koi Nation's resort and casino project on the Shiloh Road site because it is not in an appropriate location. There are no mitigations that can protect our small, quiet, peaceful, family orientated community from the intense transformation that would be required in order to accommodate the constant activity of a casino/events center/spa/hotel operating 24 hours a day-7 days a week that would bring in thousands of visitors daily.

In addition, it is important to acknowledge that, in order to accommodate this massive project, the residents living along the roadways that need to be widened (as outlined by the traffic mitigations listed in the EIS) will be displaced from their homes through eminent domain law. The act of forcing these families to relocate makes, what already feels like an incredibly invasive takeover, even more aggressive and personal.

We are also concerned about the **huge discrepancy between the Koi Nation's resources and the size of the project.** The Koi Nation is made up of only 90 members so they have partnered with the Chickasaw Nation from Oklahoma (made up of over 70,000 members) for their skills in building, managing and running the resort and casino. We can't help but wonder who is actually benefitting from this project and what will prevent the Chickasaw Nation from using their position to get a strong foothold into California where they have no historica ties.

Regarding the EIS report - in the devastating event that the BIA would approve the Koi Nation's resort and casino despite the strong opposition, we would like to highlight the following issues, hoping that, in the best interest of the local community, the BIA would require them to be resolved before any construction begins:

Traffic Concerns

- The traffic study used in the EIS is incomplete. The EIS did not take into account the new and increased traffic patterns that will be created once the building projects currently under construction on Shiloh Road are complete. This is a major concern as those projects (apartment buildings and businesses) will add hundreds of cars entering and exiting off of Shiloh Road and Old Redwood Highway every day. The only way to understand the full extent of the traffic mitigations needed for the proposed projects would be to perform an updated traffic study once the current construction projects on Shiloh Road are complete and the buildings are occupied.
- The evacuation strategies outlined in the EIS are unrealistic and unsafe. In the event of an emergency, the scale of thousands of visitors evacuating alongside the local residents and workers is unprecedented. Relying on procedures developed by lead agencies after the Tubbs fire and the outdated traffic study that did not include the current construction projects on Shiloh Road to develop an evacuation plan is an insufficient strategy to handle the magnitude of cars on the road trying to leave the area in the event of an emergency. In addition, the mitigation outlining the evacuation of the guests on site first, before an official notice is announced for the evacuation of local residents, would cause gridlock, panic and potential accidents as concerned residents try to get to their homes in order to prepare for their own evacuation or reunite with loved ones prior to the official evacuation notice. It is essential that a new and realistic evacuation plan is developed that takes into consideration the thousands of visitors on the Koi Nation's site and the local residents and workers evacuating at the same time so that appropriate road mitigations can be made prior to the site opening.
- The Fulton Road/Old Redwood Hwy intersection needs to be included in the traffic study. This intersection was not discussed on the EIS and is heavily used as an alternative route to and from the Santa Rosa airport, Hwy 101 and Hwy 12, as well as quick access to the Northern parts of Santa Rosa. This intersection would also be an invaluable alternative during an emergency evacuation. Currently, during peak traffic hours, it can be difficult to take a left from Fulton Road onto Old Redwood Hwy towards Windsor. Since the main access to the Koi Nation's resort and casino parking is on Old Redwood Hwy, evaluating the need for a traffic light and road widening on the Fulton Road/Old Redwood Hwy intersection would be essential.

 The magnitude of the road construction needed to accommodate the traffic mitigations outlined in the EIS will create a huge disruption in the community's transportation. The EIS minimizes the extent that the roadwork would disrupt current traffic patterns, calling it "short term inconveniences and mino 127-6 delays" (page 242). When extensive roadwork is performed on major roads used daily by local residents, visitors and shoppers, it is always a significant disruption. Travel time will take longer, accidents will occur, businesses will lose revenue for as many months the project takes. A clear plan on how to mitigate the traffic congestion during the construction period is essential.

Concerns about the Oversight of the Mitigation Requirements

Some of the mitigations outlined in the EIS are vague, lacking clear guidelines, requirements, and oversight. is our experience that, out of necessity, large building projects find ways to cut corners in order to save time, money and/or resolve unforeseen issues. Without firm direction and restrictions, the door is left open for variations of noncompliance. Can the BIA ensure that the mitigations will be adhered to with our community's best interest in mind? All mitigations required for the construction of the resort and casino need to be stated with clear requirements and oversight. Below are just a few examples of the lack of clarity described in the EIS:

Page ES-6, 3.5 Biological Resources - Intermittent Drainage (Pruitt Creek) and its associated Riparian Corridor - "1) Mitigation Measure A: Alterations to riparian vegetation shall be avoided to the maximum extent possible."

- Who determines what "maximum extent possible" means and when it has been met? Page ES-7, 3.5 Biological Resources, "Mitigation Measure C: Staging areas, access routes, and total area of activity shall be limited to the minimum area necessary to achieve Project goals." It is realistic that project goals can shift once construction starts. What is to prevent the "minimum
- area" from being too large and create other unforeseen issues?
 - Page ES-14, Section 3.7. Socioeconomic Conditions Fiscal Impacts "Prior to operation, the Tribe shall make good faith efforts to enter into a service agreement with the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office (SCSO)..."

"Good faith efforts" is vague and does not ensure results. Knowing that crime and traffic accidents will most certainly increase, it should be a requirement that a realistic plan is secured <u>prior</u> to operation so that the neighborhoods surrounding the site are protected.

Please remember that Sonoma County already has two casinos (River Rock Casino and Graton Resort and Casino). When Graton Resort and Casino was built, River Rock Casino's (the first casino in Sonoma County) reported a 50% drop in revenues. In order to remain competitive and draw more patrons and profits, River Roci Casino is now proposing an expansion that will add 3,079 square feet to the gaming floor, 300 more slot machines, four additional gaming tables, 1,214 square feet of extra dining space and features a new 100-room hotel tower with a spa, pool and 7,000 square feet of dining. How many more resorts and casinos does Sonoma County need before the market is saturated?

We understand that the Builders Union are the only ones for this project because they are expecting the creation of new jobs. However, there is no guarantee that the Koi Nations' proposed projects will provide jobs for locals. Not only are those construction jobs short term, but it would make sense that the Chickasaw Nation would bring their own resources and workers from Oklahoma to fill those job vacancies.

>> Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Koi Nation Shiloh Resort and Casino.

>> I live just south of the proposed casino, in the Mark West area of Sonoma County, which includes the unincorporated areas of Larkfield and Wikiup. My comments are as follows:

>>

>> - Community input: The EA seems to focus on the impact to the Town of Windsor, but little to no outreach or focus was given to the impacts of the Mark West area. Even though we are unincorporated, we have a strong community presence and would have liked to have shared our concerns and comments on the proposed casino. To say that the casino would have less than significant impact on our property values is absurd (page ES-15). No one wants to live within a few miles of a giant casino.

>>

>> - School district: The footprint of the proposed casino is within the Mark West Unified School District and is dangerously close to one of its elementary schools. Casino traffic, disorderly conduct, and drunkenness are real threats to the school district. The EIS states that the casino would have less than significant impact on the school district (page ES-19). While enrollment may not be impacted, the school district will be negatively impacted by the proximity of the proposed casino.

>>

>> - Fire evacuation: I'm sure that this will be a very common comment, as all of us living in the area have experienced evacuations many times over. I lost my home in the Tubbs Fire. The evacuation in the middle of the night in a firestorm was terrifying. Adding non-residents who are staying, or working, at the proposed casino would be disastrous. The EIS acknowledges the impact of a proposed casino on fire evacuation (pages ES-20 and ES-21). The proposed casino would share the same evacuation zone as my home. While the proposed mitigation measures say all the right words, in reality, the evacuation of hundreds of proposed casino guests and employees would clog the traffic arteries causing the residents of the area to be in grave danger. Policies and training aren't enough.

>>

>> - Traffic: If visitors and/or employees of the proposed casino are fed up with traffic on the freeway, the overflow will negatively impact the surface streets of the Mark West area, particularly Old Redwood Hwy (where people already drive above the speed limit) and Shiloh Road, a small two-lane rural road. The EIS acknowledges the significant impact of a proposed casino on traffic (pages ES-16 and ES-17), but only seeks mitigation to the area around Shiloh Road and the freeway. Attention must be given to the Old Redwood Hwy corridor as well for mitigation efforts.

>>

>> - Crime and social service needs: As the retired director of Sonoma County's Human Services Department, I know first hand of crimes in our existing casinos; crime that spills out onto the parking and surrounding areas. In addition to the typical drunk and disorderly behavior and driving, there has been a history of child abuse and neglect (leaving children in cars while parents gamble), addiction, sexual trafficking and exploitation, and other crimes. Additional services are needed to respond to these issues. The EIS states that a proposed casino would have less than significant or potentially significant impact on public services (page ES-27). I think it would be important to study the impacts of Rohnert Park and Sonoma County's services before and after the Graton Casino was built.

>> - Green space and Groundwater: Part of the culture of Sonoma County is the community separators or green spaces between cities. The proposed property is currently zoned for agricultural use and is used as a vineyard, creating a beautiful green space between Santa Rosa and Windsor. To "fill in" the community separator, starting with a casino, would change the character of the Mark West area. The EIS acknowledges the potentially significant impact of the proposed casino on groundwater resources (pages ES-22 and ES-23). My local water supplier (California American Water) has wells in the direct proximity of the proposed casino, which could be irreparably harmed by the amount of groundwater that the proposed casino is proposing to use.

A 24/7 casino, event center, and hotel would create catastrophic impacts to an already tenuous situation. Mandatory evacuations due to wildfires clogged our few escape routes. People spent hours just attempting to get on Highway 101. Stopping this project could save lives.

Drought is a very real part of living in Sonoma County. The Russian River aquifer is a fragile and limited resource we all depend upon. It could not support a huge development with an estimate of almost 300,000 gallons of water wasted daily and the potential hazards of groundwater depletion and contamination to water quality, both during construction and in the long term.

A popular Sonoma County Regional Park and a Little League park sit directly across from the proposed casino site. It is unthinkable how this project could ruin our unique public landscape. The quiet two-lane roads in this area are popular with many tourist and team bicyclists. The Nor Cal Carpenters Union is submitting this letter to the United States Department of the Interior's Bureau of Indian Affairs to emphasize the benefits that we believe the Koi Nation of Northern California's ("Nation") Shiloh Project will bring to the Town of Windsor and the Sonoma County area more broadly. We are in favor of the Shiloh Project, not only because it is projected to create many jobs for the community, but also because it is the product of thorough research that thoughtfully considered community concerns, such as those relating to wildfire hazards, emergency evacuations, and water usage.

The Nor Cal Carpenters Union has a membership of over 37,000 skilled craftspeople, making us one of the largest organized voices in the Northern California construction industry. This project will provide family supporting union jobs with benefits including healthcare and pensions to hundreds of our members who live in and around Sonoma County. The project also will provide Sonoma County residents with the opportunity to obtain training in a skilled trade, one that can provide them with the same solid economic future that this project offers to the Koi Nation. According to the Environmental Impact Statement ("EIS"), the Shiloh Project is projected to create an estimated 1,609 full-time equivalent jobs during the construction period and an estimated 1,571 full-time equivalent jobs during the operation of the Shiloh Project. This creation of jobs would serve as an important economic driver in the Sonoma County region, thereby benefiting many families and individuals who are currently seeking work.

It is also our belief that the Environmental Impact Statement was well-written and earnest in its consideration of the existing Sonoma County community. It is clear to us that the EIS reflects the Nation's commitment to addressing the issues of highest concern in the community with real sensitivity. Namely, we feel that the mitigation measures put forth in the Environmental Impact Statement thoughtfully addressed the wildfire and water management concerns raised by the community in public hearings and submitted written comments.

The Environmental Impact Statement demonstrates the Nation's understanding of the region's wildfire history by assuring the community that fire protection services will be provided, whether by the Sonoma County Fire District or by the Nation itself through the establishment of an on-site fire department that would be staffed with sufficient personnel to provide fire protection and emergency medical services for three shifts every day. Similarly, the EIS pledges to reduce fire risks during both the construction and operation of the Shiloh Project.

The Nation also took seriously the community's concerns regarding increased evacuation times and proposed multiple measures that would use expert advice to generate wildfire management and emergency evacuation plans. These measures, in addition to employee training and coordination with Sonoma County and the Town of Windsor, will serve to minimize wildfire risks.

Throughout the public comment period, the community also raised concerns relating to groundwater resources. Much like wildfire risks, groundwater depletion is a concern that has existed in the area prior to the Nation's Shiloh Project proposal. The Environmental Impact Statement's discussion of water resources illustrates the Nation's genuine desire to assuage the community concerns by walking through aspects of projected water consumption and the minimal impacts related to it under the Nation's implementation of best management practices. Where the EIS does detect cumulative effects on groundwater resources, it also proposes three extensive mitigation measures based upon the needs of the Town of Windsor that would allow the Nation to implement monitoring programs to rectify such issues.

The Environmental Impact Statement addresses many other concerns raised by the community with the same sensitivity and thorough research as it does for wildfire hazards and water resources. If the Shiloh Project is approved, we wholeheartedly trust the Nation to continue to listen to and genuinely consider the comments and concerns of the surrounding community. In doing so, we are hopeful that the Shiloh Project will serve as an impetus for economic prosperity in the region.

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I am an optometrist in Santa Rosa and have lived on Carriage Ln in Larkfield since 1990 or 34 years.

I oppose any casino development in this area as does all the local politicians and all of my neighbors and the other local tribes. There are plenty of reasons.

This would essentially destroy the bucolic semi rural peace and value of this area for a casino that should not even qualify to be here.

This is the rudest most thoughtless craven proposal by gambling interests imaginable in an area where they are fully aware they are not welcome. First they should elicit approval froim their neighbors not a unwelcome hostile takeover that would forever change the nature of and future of the surrounding communities in deleterious ways. That should be enough however there are also other good reasons not to approve this.

- 1.Water Use: This area has been in a long term, near perpetual drought for the last 15 years that have required us to restrict our water use most of the times for many years in what has been called a hundred or thousand year drought. With climate change this is likely to continue. There is not enough water in times of drought for this project. Where is the water to come from? Will it impact residents, farmers, industry, or grape growers. Will it change the nature of our rivers with more use and increased pollution. Will it affect our health?
- 2. Traffic: Will this impact traffic entrance and exit and travel times on 101 which is already stressed both north and south of Santa Rosa. They should not be permitted to buy property in Sonoma County, or anywhere else for that matter, and turn it into their homeland, especially not for the purpose of opening a casino. Just because they bought the property, doesn't mean this is the right place for a casino. The property they have purchased in Sonoma County is literally across the street from a residential community near Windsor. A casino at this location will destroy property values for families who have worked hard to buy homes in the area and create a community with children, schools, churches, parks, etc. This is a family oriented community with no place for a development like a casino.

Additionally, we have spent three years in a severe drought situation and while we are temporarily out of the drought, it will return. Building much needed additional housing that will add to the strain on our water supplies is necessary. Building a casino that will strain the infrastructure serves no purpose to better our community. Aside from that, in 2019 our entire town was evacuated due to the Kincade fire. It took over an hour to drive seven miles from Windsor to Santa Rosa because there were so many cars on the freeway with people and animals evacuating from our homes. Because of the quick action in evacuation, NO ONE DIED. Adding thousands more cars to this scenario would certainly mean people would die while trying to escape the flames, much like people died in Paradise, CA trying to escape the Camp fire in 2018. Our six lane freeway (101) runs north/south. If we had to flee east or west, there is no good way to go. Most east/west highways are two lane. People trying to flee the Oakmont, Kenwood and Sonoma areas during the many fires in 2017 or the Glass fire in 2020 faced gridlock on those two lane roads putting many lives in danger. Putting even more cars on those roads during an emergency evacuation means lives would certainly be lost. For a casino.

Finally, before making a decision on the casino issue, you should be required to come and take a tour of the area. Not an hour or two hour drive through, but spend a day or two in the area and see what a special place this is and why a casino would destroy the ambiance of this community, this town and this entire area. An environmental impact report doesn't tell you how a casino in that location would effect our entire way of life. Please deny the approval for the Koi Nation proposed casino. I am writing to express my <u>strong opposition</u> to the proposed casino project at 222 East Shiloh Road in Windsor, California. The project is completely inappropriate to be constructed at the proposed site.

The site is zoned by Sonoma County as (LIA) - Land Intensive Agricultural use and is currently used for agricultural purposes and should remain that way.

The site is adjacent to a low density residential area that has limited lanes for traffic to move into and out of the neighborhood. The impact to the local environment that would result from the construction of the proposed project would be **significant**. The impact to ground water, air quality, traffic, noise, safety (for local residents and casino/hotel guests), waste water, sanitation, etc must all be considered. As a long-time resident of Sonoma County for over 45 years and a former member of the Santa Rosa Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, I have witnessed significant growth in our region—both positive and negative. One particularly concerning development was the construction of Fountain Grove, a hillside community that unfortunately burned down completely in the Tubbs Fire, despite prior protests about its vulnerability due to a similar fire 30 years earlier. This experience underscores the importance of carefully evaluating new projects, such as the proposed casino by the Koi Nation.

I would like to express several critical concerns regarding this proposal:

- Traffic and Accessibility: The proposed site is accessible via a single road, which poses a severe risk during
 emergencies. This limitation could lead to dangerous and potentially life-threatening situations, as evidenced by the
 recent evacuation challenges during the fire.
- 2. Water Consumption: The scale of this project raises significant concerns about water usage. We have recently experienced both drought conditions and a temporary reprieve with rainfall. Given the likelihood of future droughts, the water demands of such a large-scale development could exacerbate our existing challenges.
- 3. Existing Casino Proximity: We already have well-established casinos located just 10 minutes to the north and south of the proposed site. Adding another casino seems redundant and unnecessary. This proliferation could ultimately lead to an oversaturation of the market and detract from the unique character of our community.
- 4. Community Impact: The proposed location is adjacent to neighborhoods and parks frequented by young families. Replacing a beautiful vineyard with a large casino could significantly alter the character of the area and disrupt the surrounding community. Additionally, there are concerns about the potential negative social impact associated with increased gambling activity.
- 5. Employment and Construction Challenges: While the project proponents claim it will create numerous jobs, there is already a severe shortage of available contractors due to ongoing reconstruction efforts from previous fire damage and housing shortages. 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Greetings,

I have concerns about the environmental and quality of life impact of the casino project.

My residence of 31 years is within 500 feet of the proposed project, and it will be directly visible to me.

The following concerns may have been addressed by the proposed mitigation section of the DEIR, however since the wording of the mitigation section says "proposed" and not "required" I have included all that concerns me.

- Safety, fire and earthquake Adding a significant number of cars and persons to an area where fire evacuation has already proven to be problematic (ie Tubbs Fire). Since that fire, several hundred apartment units have been added to the immediate area, and all will rely on Shiloh Road and Old Redwood Highway for a safe escape. Both roads were slow bumper-to-bumper during the mandatory evacuation orders. One only need to look at how Coffee Park was affected, where cars were left abandoned to burn when the roads became too congested to safely escape. One cannot expect the visitors to the Casino to have any idea about safe evacuation procedures, thus putting all at risk. Evacuating the cars from the recommended 5,119 parking spaces would be impossible in a timely and safe manner.
- Safety, law enforcement- It is noted that the Sonoma County Sherrif and other agencies will contract to
 provide services. Nowhere is it specified that the various agencies will increase in size so as to not dilute
 services that are already stretched thin.
- Safety, impaired driving- There is a park immediately adjacent to the project visited by kids and families on
 a regular basis. One can assume that a significant number of drivers leaving the project have had some
 amount of alcohol consumption. This is putting kids directly at risk. There is a regular use of the bike lanes
 on Shiloh and Old Redwood (myself included). The casino puts us all at risk with increased traffic and a high
 potential (certainty) of impaired driving.
- Noise, traffic- The report goes into great detail about noise measurements and methods. All of the expected noise levels are predictions and not guarantees. I would submit that the noise predictions do not take into account the increased noise from vehicle acceleration exiting after an event. Delivery truck noise is mentioned, though time-of-day is not factored in. Most deliveries of food items are performed in the early morning in refrigerated trucks. Not only does this spike the noise at that time, the refrigerated trucks have high mounted engine driven cooling units which are easily heard at great distances. Busses are often left to idle for extended periods, adding to the noise levels.
- Noise, events In addition to a spike of vehicle traffic during ingress and egress to an event, loud music is
 likely to be an issue. Mid and high tones can be somewhat attenuated with properly engineered buildings,
 low tones are unlikely to be contained. Everyone has been next to a car where the bass line reverberates
 through your car and is impossible to ignore. There is no mention in the report about continuous
 monitoring of emitted noise, nor the enforcement of the relevant noise standards should the sound levels
 be exceeded.
- Environmental, rainwater runoff A 5000+ parking lot will have a significant runoff into Pruitt creek. What
 will mitigate flow of oil, tire rubber and trash into the creek? How will this be monitored and enforced?
- Environmental, air quality High density of traffic idling after an event during egress, in addition to idling busses.
- Water usage from wells This is a great concern to my neighborhood. We are dependent on out private wells, most being about 60' in depth. The report only predicts the drawdown based on the estimated water use. A prediction based on an estimate is not much comfort. Water usage over time never decreases due to additional needs, equipment degradation, poor or deferred maintenance and leaks. If water usage monitoring is to be done to enforce compliance, what will be the actions taken? Fines? What if my well goes dry? I can't afford to have municipal water installed. Will the fines pay for that?
- With the amount of money already spent on the project by unknown investors who live nowhere near the
 project, I'm concerned that the approval of a casino is a foregone conclusion, and any input by those most
 affected is meaningless. I hope that I am wrong.

Our house is next to the church on Old Redwood Hwy and behind Groom bus maintenance facility. Our 46 acre vineyard, (with small winery and distillery) runs between our driveway on Old Redwood Highway and Hwy 101. Being this close to the proposed casino development will affect us in a large way. We are family owned and operated since the middle of the last century. Here are some of our issues.

- 1. Location It's in the middle of a mostly residential area. This area has grown around us over the years.
- Traffic One of the main entrances is across from our driveway. It's already hard to navigate onto Old Redwood Hwy. During the Tubbs Fire, it was essentially impossible.
- 3. Flooding This site floods. Pruitt Creek runs through the middle of this vineyard parcel, then under Old Redwood Hwy where it backs up with every good sized rain storm before flowing across our vineyard. We've been watching it flood this land for many years. Our vineyard also floods, and it gets worse every year as land is built up around us. This development in particular, because of the large size of it and the amount of pavement, will dump even more floodwater downstream onto us and our neighbors.
- 4. Water Five wells, new ones at 700 feet? What happens to those of us with wells around these? We operate with one agricultural well and one small domestic well as we have since the early 1950's, neither of them near that depth. How will our wells be affected?
- 5. Zoning Intensive Agriculture. This is not compliant.
- 6. **Sewage** A 3.5 acre sewage treatment plant that discharges effluent into Pruitt Creek. How will this affect the vineyards and homes when the creek floods?
- 7. Earthquake fault couldn't be closer.
- 8. Aesthetics The rendering shows a huge boxy building that dwarfs everything around it, and we'd be looking at the back edge instead of the hills we are used to seeing.
- 9. **Community** Do we really need another casino? It doesn't seem like the other casinos in the area are that busy as it is. And will a casino bring more crime into our rural residential neighborhood?

Of the three proposed plans, the only project that might fit there is the third one, the winery.

This is a very - *very* - bad idea.

- Although *very* close to huge areas scarred by prior wildfires in 2017, 2019 & 2020, the subject area has not yet burned. As such, it is extremely prone to burning in the near future.
- 2. When my family was forced to drive through a wall of fire leaving our home between 12:30 and 1:00 a.m. on October 9th, 2017, traffic was only an issue when a *burning car* forced us all into the oncoming lane.

There are only two-lane roads leaving the proposed location, which are also emergency routes for thousands of *residents* in the immediate vicinity. Widening the road (at the taxpayers' expense) is unacceptable; the added vehicle load of a major facility would undoubtedly result in unnecessary *life safety* risks to those currently *living* there.

3. Sonoma County is currently dedicating an inordinate amount of water and resources to its growing number of large apartment complexes. Adding the water consumption inherent to a landscaped, 200 room hotel with six (6) restaurants will *add* an immeasurable drain on the water resources of the area. Our son's family lives in Windsor.

This project is a bad idea for the neighborhood and local citizens. It will be a safety hazard:

- The access for emergency escape from the area will be overwhelmed. There are already neighborhoods that must use the same road, both up Shiloh and from Old Redwood Highway.
- The regular traffic from such a project will be horrible. I take my grandchildren to their schools using the "Shiloh to Old Redwood Highway" route.
- Parking for "... more than 5,000 vehicles"? From this project alone -- and they are all to use the same road? That dog don't hunt.
- This does not fit in a family neighborhood area.
- This land is located far outside any former tribal land. It's not contiguous, it's not even remotely close or connected. It was not and is not within any sphere of influence if that's the right term.
- It is totally out of character for the area and neighborhoods.

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The location of the proposed Koi Nation Shiloh Resort & Casino is an illogical and dangerous choice for a 3rd casino in Sonoma County. The proposed location sits within no more than 100 feet of multiple residential communities, including a 55 and over trailer park community, apartment complexes and numerous single-family homes. Directly across the street from this proposed location is a baseball field, where children regular rely on riding their bikes to and from the park as transportation. With the addition of casino and resort, the significant road congestion, would create an incredibly dangerous situation for anyone who is walking or riding their bikes on these narrow residential streets. In addition to significant increased light and noise pollution for the surrounding communities due to increased traffic regardless of the proposed reduction of the building light and noise.

In addition to the added traffic, that the existing infrastructure cannot support the placement of a resort and casino in that location would pose a significant risk for not just the surrounding residential communities in the event of a wildfire but for guests and employees of the resort as well. Past wildfire events that have occurred, both Shiloh Rd and Old Redwood Hwy have both been completely jammed with traffic during an evacuation as for many residents it is their only route to escape. The addition of a resort with so many additional obstacles spell certain doom on these country roads. Adding in the stress of the resort would put on surrounding wells and the water table reserves and local resources would find themselves at a significant disadvantage in the event of a wildfire like the Kincade fire of 2019 that came so close to engulfing Windsor. Furthermore, with water reserves being of significant concern in Sonoma County with recent record setting drought, and Sonoma County being a county that relies on agriculture as one of its main economies. The addition of this resort and casino not only would put undue strain on an already strained resource but the surrounding towns of Windsor, Santa Rosa and Larkfield would be greatly affected by the redirection of water.

This location has been a vineyard for years, the local ecology both flora and fauna rely on wildlands, albeit agriculturally significant to sustain, to pave over 69 acres of rural land will have a profound effect on the local wildlife and the environment. Sonoma county as a community is already experiencing profound climactic changes over the last decade, to continue to destroy what little agricultural land remains for continued development is the wrong direction for Santa Rosa, Windsor, Larkfield and Sonoma County.

Finally the crime inevitably this casino will bring to the surrounding communities, our local police forces are not funded or staffed to handle. Windsor does not have its own police force but rather relies on the Sonoma County Sheriff's department. Statistics provided from the Graton Casino and River Rock Casino and the increase in crime in the surrounding area are clear. With the surrounding residential communities, parks and schools within less than a mile from the

proposed placement of this resort and casino the increase and crime not only will have a profound effect on those residents but also will inevitably decrease property values.

The environmental study report does not acknowledge the traffic issues around the route to the casino from the other side of Shiloh Rd that crosses with Faught Rd. Fought Rd is a skinny 2 lane road with ditches on either side, 2 sharp 90 degree turns surrounded by Oak trees. This road passess right by San Miguel elementary school. And this is right where I live off Faught Rd. With much experience with the traffic on Faught Rd I can attest this is already a road where drivers speed. There are accidents and deaths on this road. You can see flowers and crosses when you drive this way. And this is just "normal" traffic. Let alone increased traffic from casino traffic and increased drunk drivers from people drinking at the casino. Kids cross the street here to play in the park and in the neighborhood.

In the last hearing I stated the Environmental Impact Study needs to assess the traffic from Faught and Shiloh Roads, but that has not been done.

I am also concerned about the light pollution. I live backing to the fields and vineyards of this proposed site. Currently it is black at night as this is a residential and agricultural area. This casino will have a significant impact on light pollution affecting not only people, their views, our circadian rhythms— which are influenced by light, but also the numerous nocturnal animals. The light's effects on the local citizens and animals' circadian rhythms—has not addressed.

There is nothing assessed about the scenic impact. This majestic valley where the casino is proposed is adjacent to the Sonoma County Regional Park of Shiloh. It is beautiful, glowing, and peaceful. The numerous people visiting Shiloh Park daily to connect with nature— not a casino—have not been addressed.

Also, we have been on water restrictions for many, many years. There is no way...NO WAY the environmental impact report accurately reflects enough water to support this project.

Also, with regards to the carpenters union during the hearings talking about jobs—that hearing is supposed to be about the environmental impact; not the economic impact. And not to mention Sonoma county's unemployment rate is extremely low at 3.3% where local businesses can't even find enough workers to fill.

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It continues to shock the mind that the BIA is still considering this project. The fact is, that the GRATON Rancheria Coast Miwok and Southern Pomos and Litton Rancheria

do NOT want this casino 15 minutes/miles away from them, just as they are expanding an already large casino to a significantly larger one. Not just that, but River Rock Casino, run by the Dry Creek Rancheria also do not want this casino which is 15 minutes/miles SOUTH of their casino. And an OK tribe stands to profit making millions upon millions of dollars. NorCal Carpenters union has sent their minions from places like Santa Cruz and beyond, hours away from our small town, calling in over and over to monopolize the calls – begging the BIA to approve this project- and these workers do not live here. They are union workers calling to get work. NOR CAL Union is based in Oakland with offices throughout California like Fresno, Sacramento, and San Jose. This is obscene. The Majority of them could care less about our town as they don't live here locally. I wonder if they have been paid to call in. For sure they just want construction work. Did the Chickasaw tribe ask them to call? I can't imagine how they might feel if it was in their neighborhood. Those carpenters just care about the almighty dollar and their next jobs. JOBS ARE NOT AN ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT so not sure why they are calling in over and over, causing local neighbors to get off this call. Also as a reminder about jobs, Sonoma County has a 4% unemployment rate so it will also be difficult to hire local. These callers sound like an advertisement for gaming industries – while none or few of them live anywhere close. We all know that the KOI are NOT native to the town of Windsor nor are they a Sonoma county tribe. They have Lake County heritage and do not belong here in Pomo/Miwok land. This is not the first piece of land they have purchased for this opportunity to casino shop, as they purchased land in Oakland. Even on WIKIPEDIA, they talk about how thousands of years ago, they were based in Clearlake. That is FAR from us. This is NOT their Aboriginal territory. This is clearly reservation shopping. Now the KOI are looking to decimate our small town that sits in the middle of a fire zone. They are planning on building such an enormous casino, hotel etc that they require over 5,000 parking spots and 7 wells. Evacuating during a fire is terrifying. We know that when there are too many cars and not a lot of places to go, with highways backing up and side roads filled with cars, people can die as they did in Lahaina. We continue to have fires - just had a small one on CHALK HILL ROAD a week ago, minutes from the casino. Fires are inevitable here and it will be completely irresponsible to build this casino. If the BIA causes deaths of Windsor residents and thousands of casino guests and casino workers trying to evacuate, I guarantee there will be lawsuits. We are warning you. We are telling you loudly and clearly this casino doesn't

belong in this neighborhood. We are screaming out loud to you- That the fire danger is quite high. It doesn't take into account how many new people are in Windsor, these new apartments. That this land was a wetland that was a firebreak. Also many of us local Windsor residents have lost our fire insurance. It has been incredibly difficult to get insurance now as State Farm cancelled almost all homes in Windsor. In addition, This study was based on a 2021 traffic study when we were still in Covid. This is completely inaccurate. Faught Road is also not even considered. Fire stations BURNED DOWN in Tubbs – a brand new multimillion fire station in Santa Rosa burned to the ground in minutes. It's not about money and funding fire stations. Wildfires are not containable because a fire department is close in proximity. Clearly people calling in have NO experience in these wildfire situations. We here in Sonoma County know. We all know this is about money. Money for the carpenters union. Money for the KOI. Money for the Chickasaw. And none of them have any experience with these fast, horrific scary wildfires. This is REAL. This is OUR LIVES here in Windsor. These carpenters don't care. The Chickasaw don't care. And clearly the BIA has NO true understanding of what we live with and the fear of an errant cigarette being flung out the window as some casino patron leaves to head home. The casino, with 5000 parking spots, is going to be in an adjacent parcel to a children's park, a church, many family homes and a brand new LARGE apartment complex where people have yet to move into. In the photos showing alternative A/B you can see HOW CLOSE people's homes are to the casino. No study was even done with all of that additional traffic with the new apartments. There is also a proposed Asphalt plant going in on Shiloh on the west side of the freeway which will also bring excessive traffic and cement trucks coming and going. Again, no study done on how that will affect Shiloh exit and all of the roads surrounding.

It certainly seems like the Federal Government and the BIA is just pushing this through, not caring about the other tribes, not caring about our concern with water (and lack of it during drought years) and the incredible fire activity. Acorn Consulting clearly has a conflict of interest. The Feds are Not caring that this tribe isn't local. Not caring that our community doesn't want this casino in our small town and in a NEIGHBORHOOD. The document you prepared is almost impossible for just regular people to read and understand. I have tried to read and comprehend and it is nearly impossible. It was a short amount of time for us to digest and it should have been made much more understandable for us regular people who truly care about our environment. You are forcing this on us and destroying our land and our community. I know many people who hung up off this call saying, the BIA doesn't care. They are just going to ram it through. The way you are treating the other nations is abhorrent and the lack of understanding of wildfires is mind boggling. I strongly oppose this casino. Send the KOI to Clearlake to build their casino.

There was a recommendation to utilize the Sonoma County sheriff's for assistance with law enforcement. The sheriff's office is already suffering from short staffing and only has around a 25% success rate of hiring staff. Did you also know that recently the Sonoma County board of supervisors passed that the Sonoma County sheriff's office will now be responsible for maintaining peace within ALL parks within Sonoma county?! That's 60 parks totaling 15,506 acres of land. How should it be the Sonoma County Sherrifs office responsibility to maintain peace or respond to incidents at a casino when they will be now be required to provide their services to the citizens of this county. How can the EIS report predict the congestion that will be caused by the additional low income housing units currently being constructed in this same area? The

I am writing to protest the idea of a huge casino and resort being built near the town of Windsor, California, for the following reasons:

- 1. The Koi nation is not a local tribe and has no particular ties to local land. If this proposal were to be approved, it would give permission for any tribe to swoop into any area of the United States, override local planning and best-use scenarios for the land, and subject local citizens to the hugely destructive impact of over-development.
- 2. A casino/hotel complex is definitely not the best use for this particular land! It should either stay in agriculture so the region can be remain food-secure, or it should be housing. Northern California's biggest need is housing, not roulette wheels. Also, recent years have brought untamable wild fires and ever-increasing heat to northern California. Bringing 5,000 visitors and their cars into the area is inviting an epic disaster.
- 3. Casinos by their very nature attract visitors who do nothing for the region but throw away their money on gambling. This may enrich the tribe and some of its wealthy backers, but will not help local economic and community needs in any way.
- 4. California Indians need redress for the awful things done to them in the past, but a solution can't be considered that does more harm to the general well-being of a community than it does good.

I hope your team will consider these points in your deliberations. I know I speak for many in the Sonoma County community who share my opinion about this casino idea.

I listened with interest to the zoom call on the EIS for the proposed Koi nation casino project outside Windsor and it was striking to me that virtually everyone who spoke in support of the casino was from the carpenters union or one of the construction trades, none of whom indicated if they lived anywhere near the affected area.

Meanwhile, people who live and work in the area and, especially, the tribal members from nations who actually claim Sonoma County as their home uniformly oppose this project. People who have lived through fires, droughts and evacuations are rightly concerned that this huge project, supposedly for the benefit of the 90 members (!) of the Koi Nation is being directed, funded and for the financial benefit of the Chickasaw Nation of Oklahoma.

The Sonoma County nations have rightfully pointed to the tenuous relationship of the Koi nation to Windsor - the Koi have historically been associated with Lower Lake in Lake County where their history spans hundreds of years. The Koi have attempted to construct casinos in Oakland, Vallejo and now Sonoma County, none of which are their true ancestral lands.

I have never objected to any other Native American project in Sonoma County, even though some of them are much closer to my house: I believe we owe much to the original inhabitants. However, in this case it certainly seems like this is a small tribe in search of a big payday but with very little actual interest in history (theirs included), the environment, the community, water supply or the support of their neighbors.

We strongly oppose this project and urge the BIA to deny the Koi Nations bid to build this project.

This letter contains my comments relating to the Environmental Impact Statement draft on the subject project located on the southeast corner of Old Redwood Highway and Shiloh Road south of the Town of Windsor, Sonoma County, California.

As I stated in my prior letter dated March 27, 2024, my family and I have lived in Windsor in the same house for the past 32 years, which is located about 2 to 3 miles north of the proposed development. We have deep roots in the community.

After a quick read of the subject Environmental Impact Statement draft, a few of my concerns previously conveyed remain. The primary issue is that the Environmental Impact Statement is limited to its regulatory parameters and by its nature cannot address the impact to the extended surrounding area and inhabitants.

The addition of yet another casino in an area with limited resources and population will continue to drastically cause negative change.

The impact on the local businesses, the available water and access to viable escape during wildfires cannot be mitigated sufficiently to negatively impact the current residents and environment, which currently need additional mitigation even without this expansive proposed development.

Sonoma County is caught between requiring additional affordable housing for its current residents and needing to limit growth due to limited water resources. Windsor's water sources are wells on the Russian River. Residences outside the town limits must rely on local wells. The water table in the area has gone through several years of drought and local agriculture suffered. During those years, water use was severely restricted in Windsor (and some communities in this and northern counties required water to be trucked in or people to move out). We were very fortunate that unusually high rains in the past few years have made those restrictions a not-so-distant memory. The area simply cannot sustain additional water usage even with extensive reuse of water. (And, the question remains, where will the staff for the development live when the area currently lacks sufficient affordable housing "stock" for its teachers, police, firefighters and other employees.)

Additionally, I cannot overly stress the horrible conditions in the area during wildfires. The climate and geography have resulted in constant wildfires, particularly during the late summer and early fall. Wildfires have always been a part of the landscape; the native vegetation is adapted to them. (We have watched the glow from fires march down the hills toward the area of this proposed development and on toward Santa Rosa ever since we moved to the area.) But in the past 5-10 years, they have become more often, stronger and vastly more destructive. The winds have become hotter, drier and stronger.

During the Kincaid fire (2019), all of Windsor was evacuated, along with the rest of the county, including the area of this proposed project. The residents were given 7 hours to evacuate, and within 2 hours of the notice, the roads out of the area were jammed down to a crawl. There are no viable alternative routes out of the area. A drive from our house to Highway 101, which usually takes about 5 minutes, took us 2 hours. The drive from Windsor to Santa Rosa, usually 10 minutes, took 3 to 4 hours. There was a very real concern that if the approaching fire picked up speed we would be caught in our cars, as tragically happened in Paradise, CA, the next year. Widening the intersection of Shiloh and Old Redwood Highway will do nothing to address this. Even with the current population, such a widening and other mitigation measures in the Environmental Impact Statement will do nothing. It is a sad fact that this is a result of climate change that cannot be mitigated solely on a local scale so that a development can be approved for short-term proposed monetary gain.

To give a perspective on the local wildfires, the prior Tubbs fire, occurred so rapidly with such intensity, people were caught and died in their homes and their cars. That fire jumped Highway 101 in Santa Rosa and burned down most of a subdivision (Coffey Park) that was not considered to be at risk of fire. Hospitals, courthouses, multi-story office buildings and markets were either burned or at risk. The metal on cars melted to the ground. The contents of "fire-proof" safes incinerated. People's remains were burned to the point that they could not be identified. (They became part of the ash.) The upscale housing area east of this proposed development on Shiloh, lost numerous homes in these fires. To put a hotel and casino in such a location is not only foolhardy, it borders on criminal should lives be lost due to future fires. No amount of mitigation is a defense when the fires become so hot and extensive.

Please seriously consider the water limitations in the area and the wildfire risks we have all lived through.

Hello,

I am writing to voice my opposition to this proposed casino. After reviewing the EIS, my primary concern would be the impact to evacuation traffic during an emergency. Shiloh Road will be a major thoroughfare for those evacuating from Shiloh Ridge Estates, as well as a secondary egress route for residents along Chalk Hill Road. Facilitating egress from these high wildfire risk areas needs to be paramount, and adding a casino of this size will only impede egress. In addition to the regular traffic at the intersections of Old Redwood Highway and Shiloh Road, new housing developments in progress will only exacerbate this concern.

A secondary concern would be of the crime in the immediately surrounding area. I see in the EIS that an MOU would be written to coordinate with Sonoma County Sheriff, however I see no mention of compensation for law enforcement services for this added tax on an already understaffed department.

A third concern that is not addressed in this EIS is the impact climate change will play on multiple factors. The floodplain of Pruitt Creek will be subject to change following wildfires increasing runoff and sediment loading of the creekbed. Additionally, a parking area and buildings of this size will create an urban heat island effect, magnified by the effects of climate change, cumulatively with additional development in the area.

The agrarian setting of this proposed casino is not conducive to the appeal that Sonoma County draws to tourists. By bulldozing vineyards and replacing with concrete and asphalt, the Koi nation is ruining an area that is not their historic homeland. I would love to support the Koi nation in their efforts of financial independence and sovereignty, but a casino in Sonoma County is not the way to go about it.

The Koi Nation bought a 68-acre property near Windsor, in Sonoma County, CA and announced its intentions to open a new casino there. I am deeply concerned about this for a number of reasons and feel very strongly that this should not be allowed to happen.

The proposed casino is at the corner of Shiloh Road and Old Redwood Highway. From that intersection, there are two traffic lights on Shiloh Road to get through in order to get on Hwy 101, the main freeway. It can already take up to three turns of the lights to get through those lights, and another light beyond the on-ramp to Hwy 101 can also cause traffic to back up. This is a two-lane road that is already inadequate for the existing traffic. There are several high-density housing developments currently under construction on both Old Redwood Highway and Shiloh Road, and several more lots are posted with signs indicating that they are also ready for development. The traffic study done by the Koi Nation didn't include any impacts from the new developments already underway or from the planned developments. The southbound traffic on Hwy 101 is already bad during the commute hours, stop and go from Windsor to and beyond Santa Rosa. We've been told the Graton casino in Rohnert Park gets 20,000 guests a day. If the Koi casino is even larger, the traffic in Windsor and the freeway traffic heading south will be a nightmare.

The proposed site is in a high fire danger area that has been forced to evacuate for wildfires or been put on alert for possible evacuation several times in the last several years. When we had to evacuate during the Kincade fire in 2019, my husband was at Home Depot on Shiloh -- it took him almost an hour to get back to our house which is just a mile away. According to MapQuest, it should only take 4 minutes! Adding a casino to

the area with around 2,000 employees and an untold number of guests is insane. When the next wildfire goes through, people could die in their cars like the tragedy that happened in Paradise, CA.

I'm also concerned about water usage. In addition to a gaming area, the proposal includes six restaurants, a spa, and a 400-room hotel. We don't have enough water for the people who are already here let alone for all these extra people. The scientific community has warned that our droughts will increase in frequency and duration. During the recent multi-year drought, we were headed to a real disaster until the rains finally came last season. I've heard that the proposed casino will put in a 700' well and pump out something like a quarter of a million gallons of water a day. Not only will all the existing wells in the area go dry in the next drought (or before), there could be problems with ground subsidence leading to property damage. Once the land is taken into trust and the casino is built, there won't be anything anyone can do about that. We've already been told to replace our toilets, dish washers, and washing machines. We've been asked to pull up all our water-intensive landscaping. We've been required to only water our lawns on certain days each week, not to wash our cars in the driveway, and to cut our usage by as much as 20%. What's next? No showering? No yards at all? No drinking water?

When the Graton Casino in Rohnert Park opened for business, it cannibalized 50 – 70% of the River Rock Casino's business in Geyserville according to the Press Democrat. The Koi Nation is a Lake County tribe with roots 50 miles away yet they bought land in Sonoma County just about half way between two existing casinos owned by Sonoma County tribes – and I don't think that was a coincidence. They plan to take business away from the two Sonoma County casinos. There are two other local tribes in the area that have expressed an interest in building casinos. The Koi Nation may have the right to build a casino in California, but it needs to happen on their own ancestral land in Lake County. It isn't fair to the local tribes to have to compete with them.

The proposed site is right next to housing developments and a church, and less than a mile from an elementary school. That is a horrible choice for a business which will bring more traffic, crime, noise, and light

pollution. Admittedly, the treatment of Native Americans in this country hundreds of years ago was terrible, but the people who own houses across the street from the proposed casino aren't responsible for what happened such a long time ago. They will be severely impacted by this casino, and their property values will plummet. My guess is that many of the houses would be devalued to the point that some homeowners would owe more on their mortgages than their homes would be worth if the casino is built. How can it be fair to let a ninety-member tribe from outside the area take so much from so many people? Other than the tribe itself, the only other people who seem to be in favor of the project are a few construction workers because it would provide jobs. These jobs would be temporary, but the damages to everyone else in the area would be permanent.

No one wants to live by a casino! Everyone who lives in Windsor will be impacted by the increase in traffic, noise, and crime, and many will see a sizable reduction in their property values. We already don't have sufficient water or adequate roads. The Graton and River Rock casinos will see a significant reduction in their profits taken by a tribe from another county. Please, please do not allow the Koi Nation to build this casino in Sonoma County!!

EIS Comments, KOI Nation Shilo Resort and Casino Submitted by: Maralee Parsons, 193 Merner Drive, Windsor CA 95492

I am writing in response to the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) published on July 8, **2024, concerning the Koi Tribe's proposed development of the 68**-acre property located on the SE corner of Old Redwood Highway and E. Shiloh Road.

The land purchased by the Koi and Chickasaw Tribes in Sonoma County is bordered by E. Shiloh Road which includes a 77 home residential neighborhood and a public Park to the north; residential neighborhoods, a school, and vineyards to the east; residential to the south; and Old Redwood Highway, residential and Shiloh Neighborhood Church, to the west. This is a strictly residential, recreational and agricultural area. Placing a 24 hour a day entertainment complex in the middle of these neighborhoods will unquestionably cause significant safety, traffic, noise and social impacts on every household, as discussed below. In my opinion, the EIS puts forth little to no additional comprehensive studies, data or mitigation efforts other than what was articulated in the previously published Environmental Assessment.

<u>Traffic/Transportation</u>

TJKM was retained to prepare a Traffic Impact Statement (TIS) on the impact the three proposed alternatives would have on transportation and circulation services in the area. TJKM prepared the TIS with minimal data. The only actual data related to this project comes from traffic monitors set up for a few hours over two days in January 2022 and one day in July 2022. The weather is cold and wet in January, and the data collected would be significantly different from that gathered over spring and summer when baseball leagues are active, and people are using the two neighborhood parks. During Spring and Summer, the parks are used daily by youth softball games, and the parking lot is full, resulting in overflow parking on Old Redwood Highway and E. Shilo Road.

The EIS references seven Cumulative Projects in section 3.14.1 that are either in construction or in the Planning and Development stage, four of which are within 1/4 mile of the proposed project. These developments will bring in approximately 500 new residential households making multiple daily trips within 1/2 mile of the proposed Casino/hotel complex. While generally referencing in the study that the cumulative projects will have an

impact on Transportation and Circulation, there is no specific information in the report or Appendices on how the cumulative residential projects will impact traffic conditions and loss of services. This must be addressed and studied further with current data.

Appendix I to the EIS estimates there will be 11,213 daily trips and 15,799 Saturday trips to and from the Koi Casino complex. There are estimates of as many as 1340 hourly trips... or 22 cars per minute. The Traffic Impact Study (TIS) confirms that this traffic increase will have a substantial impact on the roadways and intersection that rise to a level of unacceptable Loss of Services (LOS). The TIS then cites mitigation efforts that will make the LOS acceptable without providing any substantive information on how this will be accomplished. It does not offer any concrete information on how the mitigation efforts will improve conditions or provide any guarantees that they would be effective. This must be addressed, and mitigation efforts spelled out in detail.

Water resources

Potable water- The EIS projects that Alternative A would pump between an average of 170,000 gallons per day (gpd) to a daily peak of 294,000 gpd from onsite wells. The new well(s) will require a water treatment plant and a large storage tank to hold the treated water. Water from the treatment plant would be sent to a one-million-gallon storage tank and then to a pumping station for distribution to the facility. The drawdown on existing wells is a very real likelihood. The evaluation discounts or ignores climate change, drought and water rights issues. The EIS indicates that the onsite wells would be deep wells (700 feet) and that the shallow wells belonging to nearby residents are at most risk. How will this be addressed? The report discounts the risk, cost and impact of reduced or inadequate water supplies to local residents.

Wastewater-The EIS calls for the construction of a Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) to treat the estimated average of 232,000-335,000 gallons of wastewater discharged each day, or 1,624,000 on an average day and up to 2,345,000 on peak days. Figure 2.5 in Appendix D is a diagram of the Project Water and Wastewater Feasibility Study Wastewater Treatment Process Flow. Estimating its size (using the truck as a gauge), the system will be over 500 feet long x 300 feet wide and up to three stories high. There is also the likelihood of odor emanating from the plant, subjecting the hundreds of families who live in the immediate proximity to this environmental nuisance/hazard.

Groundwater Discharge- The project site is currently a 68-acre vineyard. As farmland, the landscape is permeable, allowing for water to permeate the soil. The proposed project will result in over 35 acres of this land being paved and developed, significantly altering groundwater conditions. In addition to the loss of permeable land there is significant risk of pollutants entering Pruitt Creek despite "best management practices". In my view, this is a "significant impact".

Public Evacuation

This is my greatest concern. The proposed Alternatives A, B and C will attract a large volume of patrons who will need to be evacuated during a wildfire event. The facility will have parking for over 5,000 cars and will accommodate more people than cars. There will also be people using rideshare and public transportation and any evacuation plans will need to account for this group. The Project Site would have access to two major emergency routes identified by the Town of Windsor: Shiloh Road and Old Redwood Highway. These are single lane roads which will not only be used by casino patrons but also used by evacuating neighborhoods. Past evacuations during the Tubbs and Kincaid fires resulting in stopped traffic and dangerous conditions on both roads, with embers landing around cars. Old Redwood Highway and Shiloh Road cannot handle the addition of thousands of more cars and people during a time-critical evacuation effort.

The EIS recommendations include following "best management practices" and training employees on evacuating guests in the event of a fire. Well, that may help to get casino guests out of the casino safely, but does not, in any way, address the tremendous strain on the emergency evacuation routes, hindered access for emergency responders, and the potential loss of life for residents. This must be addressed!!

Socioeconomic conditions-

Crime- The EIS and Appendix B-1 do not provide any substantive information other than the fact that law enforcement received 1,700 calls and made 39 arrests at the Graton Rancheria in its first year of operation. After a comparison of the Graton Rancheria Casino and the proposed Alternative A, the EIS concludes "As a result of this quantitative and qualitative analysis, GMA finds that the negative impacts on community services in areas in which a casino has opened are generally minimal." The report, however, does not include any "quantitative and qualitative" information other than from the 2014. This must be addressed and re-evaluated using current data.

Drunk Driving- The EIS states "The proposed project intends to serve alcohol consistent with a liquor license, which could result in an increase in drunk driving incidents." It then states, "Drunk driving prevalence is not anticipated to increase significantly as a result of the proposed casino resort...". The only mitigation offered is the implementation of a "Responsible Alcoholic Beverage Policy". This is required by California law for all establishments selling alcohol and is not, in fact, a "mitigation action". The conclusion of little impact is not supported by any substantive information and is preposterous.

Finally, I urge you to strongly consider the arguments previously articulated by the broad opposition to this project within Sonoma County, including the community, State and Federal officer holders, and the unanimous resolutions of opposition of both the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors and the neighboring town of Windsor.

Dear Ms. Dutschke and Mr. Broussard,

I am writing as a direct neighbor to the proposed Koi Nation Shiloh Resort and Casino. By direct, I mean <u>directly</u> across Old Redwood Highway from the southeast corner of the intended property. I am a resident of one of the two mobile home parks that are next door neighbors to each other - Mobile Home Estates and Colonial Park, with Pruitt Creek running between the two parks.

I DO NOT WANT THIS CASINO!

The **GENERAL NEIGHBORHOOD ENVIRONMENT** will be ruined for the residents of this unincorporated area and the entire town of Windsor. This is not the area/neighborhood for a development such as this. Currently, it is a residential/semi-rural/agricultural area. There are many single family homes adjacent to a popular town park, Esposti Park, at the intersection of Shiloh East and Old Redwood Highway that is used for little league baseball, soccer, family picnics and a stopping point for many cyclists traveling Old Redwood Highway. There is a County Regional Park also adjacent to the east of the site, used by residents from all over for hiking, dog walking, horseback riding. Both these parks add to the general family friendly atmosphere of the area. A casino will not add to this atmosphere that has been purposely cultivated with the current amenities.

WATER is an issue all over California and the surrounding properties mainly get their water from a well. A development of this size will negatively impact the water availability for all wells in the area. This includes the town of Windsor that currently has 2 wells located at Esposti Park that are used for municipal drinking waster and irritation. Mitigation payments to other private parties who have reduced water from their wells will not replace the water...you can't drink money! Additionally, between the two mobile home parks mentioned above runs Pruitt Creek. My understanding is there are plans for the casino to release wastewater into Pruitt Creek. Please note this creek is dry much of the year and floods during heavy rain. Is it also true that part of this creek, that also flows on the proposed casino site, will be rerouted and/or paved over? Is any of this responsible creek or source water stewardship? I think not.

<u>LIGHT, AIR AND NOISE POLLUTION.</u> A 24/7 lighted facility with a 400 room hotel, 5000 parking spaces and additional structures will add noise, light and air pollution that will disrupt the local population of people and wildlife.

TRAFFIC will be an issue. My understanding is the traffic study was completed during Covid when people were not going out as usual. How can that be used as an accurate measure for traffic impact? Old Redwood Highway is used as a second Highway 101 all day long! It is already difficult to exit or enter my park with the traffic, especially during the morning and all afternoon into

the evening. Proposed widening of Shiloh and Old Redwood Highway are not part of the cost which will be born by the casino and most traffic mitigation suggested is inadequate and unrealistic. This doesn't even touch on the issue of needing to evacuate should there be another fire - which is almost inevitable. Evacuation during the Kincade fire was next to impossible, with Old Redwood Highway, Shiloh, Hembree, etc and Highway 101 backed up, bumper to bumper in every direction. Add another 500 - 2,000 cars, depending on day and time of day and it will be impossible to manage! Remember, power was/will most likely be out and traffic and street lights weren't/won't be working! Traffic control will most likely not be available from Highway Patrol, County Sheriff, or town police - they will elsewhere.

Increased <u>CRIME</u> will be an issue. Statistics show, and we know firsthand from the Graton Casino, that crime is a factor. DUIs, drugs, public intoxication, prostitution, human trafficking, etc. will be introduced into our pleasant community. Who will be ar the brunt of this or the cost to town and county policing services, or even for Highway Patrol?

HEALTHCARE will be impacted and felt by the local medical facilities, already stretched thin at Sutter Memorial Hospital and Kaiser, many still struggling after loosing doctors and other medical professionals who left after losing homes in recent fires and the toll that Covid wreaked. This will impact all locals who rely on these services.

The **POWERGRID** will suffer! With climate change, our hot days are hotter and more frequent. AC usage already causes stress on our power grid and power outages will only get more frequent. The power used by the casino will drag an already fragile system and most likely cause rate hikes for this locals.

I'd also like to note:

- The tribes of Sonoma County, mainly the Graton and Lytonn Rancherias are opposed because the Koi's tribal land is in Lake County, not Sonoma.
- The mayor and town council of Windsor are opposed.
- Our state representatives, Jared Huffman and Mike Thompson are opposed.
- Dianne Feinstein and Alex Padilla, CA State Senators are opposed.

I urge the BIA to NOT APPROVE this project moving forward, Plan D in the EIS. I also urge the Koi Nation to consider building in Lake County to improve the employment opportunities and other benefits a casino might bring to their own tribal land.

Valley, and Cache Creek were all built in nonresidential, unpopulated areas and are very successful, beautiful casinos.

My name is Tsim Schneider. I'm an enrolled Citizen of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria, the federally recognized tribe of Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo people whose ancestors faced and survived multiple phases of colonial violence and displacement by missionaries, soldiers, and settlers from Spain, Mexico, Russia, and the United States. I am also an Associate Professor of Anthropology at the University of California, Santa Cruz, where I teach courses on archaeology, colonialism, and Indigenous peoples of California. I am writing to protest Koi Nation's proposal to build a resort and casino at 222 E. Shiloh Road in Santa Rosa, California. To be certain, I have no issue with Koi Nation exercising their sovereign rights under federal law to obtain economic independence and support Koi Nation community membership. I am calling into question Koi Nation's performance of sovereignty on - and cultural and historical claims to - Indigenous land that is not theirs but is instead a known place within the traditional territory of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria, the federally recognized Tribe of Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo people.

Our history and connection to that place and the surrounding area are unquestionable. Since time immemorial the societies and economies of Coast Miwok speaking peoples and Southern Pomo peoples intersected amicably along the Russian River corridor, Laguna Santa Rosa, and Santa Rosa Plain. As documented by ethnographers, outsiders (neighboring Pomo, Wappo, and others) may have been granted safe passage to the coast and permission to gather food and raw material. However, these interactions were ephemeral, and they do not represent deep ties or equivalent claims to the land. The Koi Nation presents a "Pomo expansion model" to argue their "primacy" in southern Mendocino County and northern Sonoma County. The model attests to the ancient history of Pomo peoples and a homebase in the eastern Clear Lake basin. The archaeological and linguistic evidence appear to suggest a migration of Pomo peoples west from Clear Lake toward the Russian River around 2,500 years ago, representing the beginning of new and different Southern and Southwest Pomo cultural traditions and distinct languages. This evidence does not give the modern Koi Nation of eastern Lake County the right to now claim the spaces that their distant (and distinct) relatives occupied for at least 2,500 years. It would be similar to someone who speaks Turkish claiming land in France because Anatolian languages were the first to split from a shared Proto Indo-European language family. In this instance, supporting Koi Nation's startling claims would harmfully overwrite the unique histories, languages, and cultures of the Southern and Southwest Pomo peoples. A dangerous precedent for California Indian Country would also be set.

The Shiloh Road property is part of a place that reflects the unique postcontact history of our Tribe, not Koi Nation. As my research shows, my Tribe is one with ancient and unassailable ties to the landa territory where our ancestors are buried, where our traditions are kept alive, and where our families continue to gather in community. Koi Nation's website presents a history of Euro-American contact and colonization centered on their traditional home 50+ miles away in eastern Lake County during the mid- to late-1800s, a brutal era of United States settler colonialism and military violence. "As a result," they state, "the Koi Pomo then came to live in communities along the Russian River Valley from Sebastopol to Clear Lake"—a known place, the statement overlooks, for Southern Pomo and Coast Miwok families who have always called it home. Since the late-1700s, by contrast, the ancestors of present-day Graton Rancheria Citizens faced - and resisted - sequential waves of Euro-American colonization by representatives of Spain, Mexico, Russia, and the United States. For each iteration of greed, land theft, and violence, our ancestors remained connected to their traditional lands and cultural traditions, and they sustained those connections even while families were being pulled apart. Some fled San Francisco Bay missions seeking protection in their traditional lands. Others evaded wandering padres and soldiers-intruders bent on taking away our land, our bodies and spirits, and our way of life. Still others negotiated settler court systems to gain title to land at Olompali and Nicasio, or defiantly remained living on family homesteads before being gathered together as "homeless Indians" at the Graton Rancheria in the early 1900s.

Tsupu, an ancestor for many Graton Rancheria Citizens including me, fled Rancho Petaluma for the Russian mercantile colony of Fort Ross on the Sonoma County coast sometime between 1834 (when Rancho Petaluma was established) and 1841 (when Fort Ross was sold). To do so and to evade capture, Tsupu chose a route as only a local with knowledge of the land would have been able to do. Her survival and her traditional cultural and ecological knowledge of the land paved the way for her children and grandchildren. More recently, one of Tsupu's great grandkids (and my great grandmother) was born to a Coast Miwok father and a mother who proudly identified as "Pomo" on the 1928 "California Indian Enrollment Application" and hailed from the Healdsburg area (approximately 10 miles north of Shiloh Road). Photographs of family get-togethers at the Russian River and other southern Sonoma County places in the early 1900s—indeed the entire Graton Rancheria Tribe of Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo people—reflect all of the places our ancestors lived, worked, resisted, and remained connected to at all cost. The history I know, as a Native person and a professional anthropologist, is not Koi history.

Koi Nation's proposal dishonors the locally-specific Native history of that Southern Pomo place as well as the sovereignty of the rightful descendants, the Federated Indians of Graton of Rancheria, who continue to honor their history and steward their traditional territory of southern Sonoma and Marin counties. In simple terms, 222 E. Shiloh Road is not their land.

I am writing to you as I am a citizen of Windsor, California. I participated on the zoom call on July 30, 2024 at 6 PM. A majority of the people who were on the call were against having a casino built at the proposed location. Both Town Council of Windsor and Santa Rosa are against having a casino built

Here are the many issues brought up:

The Koi Nation is from Clear Lake, CA not from Santa Rosa, CA. They are 60 miles from their native lands. No casino has been built in California farther than 15 miles from their native lands.

The land has always been for Residential, agricultural and limited commercial use as mentioned in your EA report. It has Pruitt Creek that runs through the property and floods every year.

The road is only a two lane road and would cause extreme problems for the citizens who live nearby if and when they have a fire, earthquake or other natural disaster. The proposed casino stated in their Environmental Impact report expects to have approximately 2,000 to 5,000 people traveling on Shiloh Road each day. This could be the equivalent of 2500 cars each day.

The U.S Fish and Wildlife Service has stated the endangered Tiger Salamander, Red Legged Frog, potential issues to coho salmon that can be found throughout Windsor, CA. This was in an article on August 31, 2011 from Patch.com. Measure L mentions this in your report, my question is how do you control habitat needs? What measures are to be taken?

It has been proven that where there is a casino an increase in crime, drunk driving, accidents and more have substantially increased. Currently Santa Rosa and Windsor police forces are understaffed as well as the Sonoma County Sheriff's Department. In your EIS report you mention having best management practices to solve these issues and shall "make best efforts to enter service agreements with the Sheriff and Fire Departments, again there are no guarantees which could result in an increase

The casino will also increase noise, air, lighting and groundwater pollution. This is addressed as only an LS (less than significant) issue. It is very much a *huge* concern to homes and businesses in the surrounding area.

During the proposed construction phase lasting from 2023 until the opening date of 2028, the large construction trucks and workers building from 7 am until 5 pm will create a lot of noise, traffic congestion and increase smog in the area.

The casino will affect local businesses and adjacent casino's. In your report you state there will be an overlap of potential market area and project site. Four casino's affected will be: Graton Resort and Casino, Cache Creek Casino Resort, River Rock Casino and San Pablo Lytton Casino.

Secondary markets that will also be affected are: Twin Pine Casino and Hotel, Coyote Valley Casino and Hotel, Robinson Rancheria Resort and Casino, Konocti Vista Casino Resort and Sherwood Valley Casino.

Regarding housing, property values, schools and businesses near the proposed casino in your, "sensitive receptors" section you state only LS. Growth Inducing Effects as stated in your report state it will have a negative effect on roadways infrastructure, sewer and water services.

It is known that property values go **DOWN between 2-10% near a casino!**They will also be affected by construction noise, night lighting issues, air pollution from all the vehicles, etc.

The needed water of 170,000 gallons per day of potable water and 108,000 gdp of recycled water. Potable water supply would be provided via on-site wells, and recycled water (tertiary treated effluent) would be provided from the on-site wastewater treatment facilities (see Section 2.1.4). Recycled water would be used for toilet and urinal flushing, on-site landscape irrigation, on-site vineyard irrigation, and cooling tower makeup. Fire flow requirements for Alternative A are anticipated to be 2,000 gallons per minute for 4 hours assuming the use of automatic fire sprinklers consistent with applicable requirements of the Tribe's Building and Safety Code of 2023, which are consistent with the California Building Code (CBC, Appendix D-1). as mentioned in 2.1.3 in the report would require several wells at a depth of 700 ft. Currently the surrounding wells on homeowners properties, according to those who spoke on the zoom video, are drying up or are not usable. This brings up many issues, one is where will the casino get water if the wells cannot produce enough to support the casino, hotel and pool? This will impede growth for needed housing, agriculture and other businesses that depend on water.

Another item mentioned in the report is that the casino would be located in a "high fire zone". I did not find where the Koi Nation would be building a fire station nearby. Other major concerns are how to get all the people safely evacuated. Regarding emergencies it is stated you will ONLY have three employees trained as a firefighter and EMT. This will NOT be enough workers to assist in case of an emergency

Both the council members of Sonoma County, including Santa Rosa and Windsor are opposed to having this casino built. The Graton and Dry Creek Pomo tribes have also stated they are against the casino. Many callers from union construction companies that were told they would be hired by the Koi Nation were the very few in favor of the casino.

I am hoping the Koi Nation decides to do 3.13.3.5 Alternative D: No Action Alternative

I am a Tribal Citizen of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria (FIGR), located within the Wine Country of Sonoma County and I vehemently oppose the Koi Nation (a Lake County Pomo tribe from more than 50 miles away), applying for Fee-to-Trust status to take land from *our* ancestral territory—for the purpose, not only of a reservation far from their original home, but to establish a casino *in my backyard* to directly compete with two tribal casinos already established within a 20-mile radius from me.

I was born and raised here in the heart of Wine Country—this is a county of limited space, extremely unaffordable housing with low inventory, prime agricultural land and rampant, world-renowned wine tourism. It's a place I've witnessed change beyond recognition from the humble farming community I roamed on horseback as a child. There is no room here for reservation shopping and unlimited casinos. This project is proposed on an intersection between single family homes and open vineyards in the small, congested Town of Windsor. I cannot think of a more inappropriate place to build any kind of large commercial project, even by a tribe that actually belongs here.

Setting a precedent that is opposite to a long standing tribal and federal government tradition is a dangerous affair, with repercussions for both sides. This is an attempt to erode tribal sovereignty—historically not a new concept. However, this tribe nor the ones funding or supporting them seem to realize the consequences of losing our status as sovereign nations. No, money and greed is the motivator here—not the history nor honor of our ancestors. Allowing tribes to take land into trust for casinos wherever their members traveled for work or trade means that our own tribe could establish a casino in San Francisco. Is that what the BIA really wants? Tribes across wide geographical areas traded regularly with each other and socialized/married outside of their immediate point of origin, but that does not mean that was their home—the same way traveling to France does not automatically make you a citizen. My own grandparents met traveling on the road picking hops and prunes; sometimes living in different areas for extended periods for work—but they knew where Home was. This action would also infringe on the cultural, historical, and territorial rights of other tribes in Sonoma County such as the Dry Creek, Lytton, and Cloverdale Rancherias and drastically impact any future economic projects they should pursue.

The DOI is obligated to uphold the existing laws established by the long tribal and federal government relationship. The Koi Nation must also follow these laws and seek a reservation in their own ancestral territory, in their true and original homeland of Lake County. This is something we were required to do as well. It should be no different for any other tribe.

STATEMENT FROM GREG SARRIS, TRIBAL CHAIRMAN, FEDERATED INDIANS OF GRATON RANCHERIA ON THE PROPOSED SHILOH CASINO PROJECT IN WINDSOR. CA

The Koi Nation seeks to establish Trust land in Windsor, CA, with the express purpose of building a casino resort. Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria (FIGR) vehemently oppose this action, as the lands in question sit within our federally assigned ancestral homeland. This action threatens to set a dangerous precedent against Tribal sovereignty with implications for tribes in California and nationally.

Detailed anthropological, archeological, and linguistic research, as well as our family oral histories, clearly establish the fact that Koi Pomo Nation with its historic territory in eastern Lake County has no claim in any manner to our territory. In fact, their customs as well as their language were and are totally different from those of the Southern Pomo, our ancestors. Their aboriginal lands, on which their rancheria was established, are fifty-nine (59) miles from the site they claim in Windsor and their historic territory. The Koi claim their ancestors had a history of trading with our ancestors, which may or may not have been true. While all tribes traded with one another, traditional territorial boundaries were – and should be today – strictly respected. Permission for a tribe to cross another tribe's territory, say if an eastern tribe wanted to make a trek to the ocean, could only happen after the latter tribe gave permission to cross its territory. Not asking permission to cross, disrespecting tribal boundaries, most certainly resulted in war, often in the form of "poisoning" the offenders.

Further, there is no logic that just because one's ancestors traded with another's ancestors (from a different tribe), that the descendants can claim that they have a right to settle on the territory of the people they traded with. For example, if you came to my grandmother's backyard to trade your carrots for my grandmother's apples, that does not mean you can come and claim my grandmother's backyard as your own today – which is exactly the claim Koi Nation of eastern Lake County is making.

Their claims of historic connection are flawed and if accepted by the Department of Interior (DOI), would set a dangerous precedent for all California Indians – in fact, for all Indian Nations – not only creating the reality of a casino on every street corner, but, no doubt as a result, also creating a major challenge to what currently constitutes our sovereignty as federally recognized Indian nations.

Koi Nation falsely claims that our Southern Pomo land is part of their aboriginal territory even while currently giving tours of Anderson Marsh in Lake County, describing to people how the Lake County region is their aboriginal home.

The Koi tribe uses post-European contact history as a way to establish "a deep historical connection to the land," which the Department of Interior (DOI) uses as a requirement for a tribe to take land for its use (i.e. for a casino) into Trust. They claim, for instance, that they have a history of working for General Vallejo, which would have been sometime between 1824 and 1850 (when California became a state). For the record, ever since first contact with the Spanish (before the Mexican revolution and secularization of the missions), California Indian people were forcibly moved into missions both far and near to their aboriginal homelands. We (FIGR), too, worked for

General Vallejo. But before that, we have detailed and well documented history of our Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo ancestors forcibly removed from what are today known as Marin and Sonoma Counties into Mission Dolores (in present day San Francisco), and into missions in Santa Clara and San Jose, all of which are in the true aboriginal homelands of Ohlone Nations. Using the Koi claim of working for General Vallejo as a deep significant historical connection to the land, means that almost any Northern California tribe could violate Ohlone Nations rights and disrespectfully apply for Trust status on their lands — and ultimately build casinos from downtown San Francisco to San Jose and all over Oakland and the East Bay.

The DOI has never taken land into Trust for a tribe further than 15 miles from its aboriginal territory, or from where its first U.S. established reservation was located. Once again, Koi is seeking to take land into trust 59 miles from its aboriginal territory. This illegal land grab is not limited to the Koi – the Scotts Valley Pomo, also from Lake County – is seeking to take land into Trust in Vallejo, which is Wintun territory, over 60 miles from Scott's Valley territory in Lake County. Koi, by the way, attempted to take land into Trust in 2012 next to the Oakland Airport, claiming they had a "deep connection to the land". Also, once again using the claim that they had worked for General Vallejo.

It is evident that if the 15 mile precedent is broken and tribes can muddle what constitutes a "deep connection to the land", a new precedent will be set whereby, as a result of our Spanish, Mexican, and early American history, we as California Indian people will be able to make claims just about anywhere to establish Trust land and build casinos on every street corner in the state of California – and everywhere else in this country for that matter. Such a scenario is certainly not what Californians want and will certainly turn public opinion against us and our businesses, which, as history has shown, results in federal laws that can and will challenge our sovereignty.

It is true that the 1910 California Indian Rancheria Act created to provide sovereign homes – rancherias, reservations – for the homeless Indians of California – often bundled aboriginal tribes and villages together, thus sovereign nations from specific locations of survivors were created. Approximately 15.5 acres of land northeast of Sebastopol (Graton) was set aside for the "homeless Indians of Tomales Bay, Bodega Bay, Sebastopol, and the vicinity thereof." In other words, the Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo survivors of the historic genocide, were given land and recognized as a sovereign nation. Yes, we lost the land, as many of the rancherias/nations did, as a result of the 1958 California Rancheria Termination Act. We were illegally terminated, which the federal government acknowledged when President Clinton signed our Restoration Bill on December 27, 2000. We applied to put land into Trust (a new reservation in Rohnert Park), which is approximately 7 miles from our original reservation in Graton – NOT 59 MILES! We stayed both within the territory where our people have a true "deep historic connection to the land," and within the 15-mile precedent established by the DOI for taking land into Trust for a landless tribe. We followed the rules. Koi and Scott's Valley must do the same for the good of all American Indian people.

I am specifically commenting on the Traffic Impact Study (TIS) as presented in Appendix I of the EIS (publication July 2024).

I noted that the turning movement data for Existing Traffic Conditions in Section 3.1 of Appendix I were collected on January 28, 2022 and January 30, 2022. Then Average Daily Trip (ADT) data was collected on July 28, 2022.

The first problem is that Section 3.1 notes January 30, 2022 as a "Saturday". When January 30, 2022 was a Sunday. So a correction needs to be made one way or the other.

I believe that the EIS 2022 TIS traffic data is now too old to be used for this EIS analysis for the following reasons.

- 1. First, 2022 was not that long after the Covid pandemic, during which many local businesses were still encouraging and allowing work from home. This decreased the 2022 daily trips throughout this region of Sonoma County, but has now (2024) rebounded to pre-pandemic levels and possibly higher.
- 2. Second, it is not clear whether the TIS incorporated traffic counts from the currently constructing Shiloh Crossing apartment development located at 295 Shiloh Road. The project includes a total of 173 apartments and 8,000 square feet of commercial space. Other approved development projects and their expected trip counts should also be incorporated into the existing traffic conditions.

3. ADT counts were taken in July of 2022. This is a season when schools are typically not in session, nor are many after-school activities. A better peak time for ADT counts would have been in April or September of a given year.


Therefore, I request that the EIS perform a new TIS which includes recent traffic counts and incorporates expected new development within the project study area. I believe new traffic counts will show that some intersections and queue storage will fall below the LOS standards set for this EIS and will have a significant unmitigated impact.

I believe the trip distribution and assignment assumptions of Section 4.3 do not align with my observations, being a resident of this immediate area for the past 17 years. I would like to know how the trip distribution and assignment percentages were calculated. I would think that the percentage of trip generation from 101 to the south would be far higher than 45 percent.

I would also like to know how the traffic counts were conducted, whether through video detection, pneumatic tubes, or other. If through video detection, I would like to know specifically where the cameras were placed, as improper placement can affect the quality of the traffic count data.

I reside 500 yards from the above proposed project's entrance, and I urge the BIA to reject the conclusion in the draft EIS published July 8, 2024 to the effect that adverse environmental effects could be mitigated.

- The project would subvert the County of Sonoma's zoning plan and commitment to residents to preserve open space and agricultural use.
- The EIS does not assess the project's potential increase of need for law enforcement and emergency services or address the capacity of local agencies to supply services. In this county area outside city limits, we don't even have patrol. The county law enforcement does not enforce traffic, and we have only the CHP, whose cars are on the freeway rather than on our two-lane roads. "Proposing to enter into a contract" for law enforcement and emergency services is not meaningful.
- The proposals concerning restriping pavement don't address the inadequacy of the width of the roads to add lanes.
- No amount of disaster preparedness is going to change the fact that there aren't enough roads to evacuate the increased population of the proposed projects.
- "The use of BMPs would minimize impacts...no mitigation required", repeated seems facile. The practices are not defined or described. No one who lives in the neighborhood believes that any version of this project would be insignificant.

Please don't allow a casino or hotel here. Thanks for your consideration.

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the Koi Nation's proposed project to establish trust land in Windsor, California, for the purpose of building a casino resort. I am a Sonoma County Indian and resident, and an enrolled member of the Federated Indians of Rancheria, Sonoma County has been home to my people for generations.

The Koi Nation has every right to assert their legal rights as an indigenous tribe within their own territory in Lake County. However, their attempt to establish trust land in Sonoma County is deeply concerning. Our tribal lands hold immense cultural and historical significance. The Sonoma County Tribes have protected and preserved these lands for countless generations. The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) should consider another location for this project in the Koi Nation's ancestral territory.

BIA must adhere to established rules regarding restored lands. Ignoring our sovereignty and lands given to us by the federal government under the 1910 California Rancheria Act and allowing the Koi Nation to encroach upon our territory disrespects our heritage and our rights as federally recognized tribes. The BIA would be taking away the very sovereignty that they are supposed to protect.

The Koi Nation's historical and cultural connections are rooted in Lake County, *not* Sonoma County. Their customs, language, and traditions are distinct from those of the Southern Pomo tribes like mine. The Koi Nation's claims of historic connections based on trading interactions are flawed. Trading goods with another tribe does not grant territorial rights. Such interactions were common among tribes but did not imply ownership or rights to the land.

This project would have significant effects on the sovereignty of my Tribe and our cultural resources. I urge the BIA to consider alternative project sites for the Koi Nation that do not infringe upon the cultural and sovereign lands of other tribes. Protecting tribal sovereignty and cultural resources is not just a legal obligation, but a moral one.

Dear Mr. Broussard,

I am a tribal citizen of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria.

I write to you to express my utmost concern with the casino being proposed in Sonoma County by the Koi Nation.

The Koi Nation has no ancestral ties to the area they are proposing this massive development. They are native to an area in Lake County, over 50 miles away from the site they now claim as theirs. In fact, they are trying to mislead you and the rest of the Bureau of Indian Affairs by claiming they have historic ties to an area where Southern Pomo lived for thousands of years and hope that by conflating the terms "ancestral" and "historical" they can create enough confusion as to undo long held precedent about what Indian tribes may claim as their territory.

In doing so, they risk creating a scenario where any tribe could argue that any sort of historical connection their ancestors had at any point to any location entitles them to take land there into trust and build casinos. For example, my Coast Miwok ancestors were brought by Spanish missionaries to San Francisco as slaves for Mission Dolores. Does that entitle my tribe to build casinos in San Francisco even though it's outside our ancestral territory? Furthermore, my family has now lived in San Francisco for five generations going back over 100 years. Does that entitle us to call this our ancestral land? Where does "history" begin and end?

This will be a nightmare if it is allowed because it will be a mad dash for all tribes to propose casinos all over the place and will result in extreme amounts of conflict between otherwise cooperative tribes and will pejoratively affect all Native Americans in the state.

All tribes should be entitled to self-determination and economic development within their ancestral territory. Since the Koi Nation's proposed casino and resort falls outside their ancestral territory and infringes on the territory of other tribes, it should be denied.

I don't see how the BIA could even consider allowing an Indian Casino in this residential neighborhood. Just from the point of Wildfire Evacuation, it will be so backed up that people are going to be burned to death in their cars, trying to get out.

I listened to the ZOOM meeting on Tuesday July 30, 2024, the only people that were for the project, stood to gain financially and they would not have to live with it later. You could hear the carpenters that called in, were reading from talking points they were given. With the carpenters that called in by phone, it would show the area code they were calling from. Many times it was area 209 and 510, not even close to this residential area.

In fact the only carpenter that called in, said he lived on Faught Road, which is close, but still not right next to it.

There are no casino's in residential areas in Sonoma County, the Graton Casino is in the commercial area of the city of Rohnert Park and River Rock Casino is in the hills East of Geyserville.

The Koi Nation is reservation shopping and trying to get closer to the Bay Area, but they are from Lake County.

the Lower Lake Rancheria, submitted a restored lands gaming application to the **D.S**. Department of the Interior (DDI) for a parcel located outside the Town of Windsor, in Sonoma County. The proposed project location is over a 50-mill drive from the Koi Nation's ancestral and cultured roots in the Lower Lake area of Lake County, where its historic vancher in was located.

Dol is supposed to protect tribal sovereignty and this precedent setting proposal by the Koi Nation is actually underdoing tribal Sovereignty. Dol is now being put in the

position of pitting Undians against Undians here in California, Our tribes were not removed from their ancestral homelands, like tribes in Oklahoma. Un California, tribes were not removed, but were decumated in place. As my Tribe and others, rebuild, our Tribal Citinens are returning to their ancestral territories.

DOI must consider an alternative location For the koi Nation in their true nomeland in lake County, DOI would be wrong to allow for koi Nation to jump unto another tribels by trying to demonstrate a significant historical connection to our Southern Pomo territory based on trade routes or one family moving to our territory. Koi Nation's application is Simply a new twist on their previous efforts to acquire gaming sites outside of their ancestral territory, which DOI was correct to deny on the same grounds.

I support the right of all tribes to restore their homelands and pursue gaming on those lands. I cannot, however, support this project, It undermines tribal sovereigntly and would be to the detriment of the identity, sovereigntly, and cultural rights of the federally recognized tribes in Sonoma County.

Dear Mo: Dutschke, We are writing to you to tell you That we oppose the above ramed resort and We have lived in the Lorkfield since 1989 (35 years) Where we own a home and raised our 2 children We feel a strong bond to our neighborhood in the unincorporated area between Santa Rosa and windsor with its semi-rural atmosphere. The proposal to build The casino resort about one mile north of our home was a shock! The neighboring area is a mix of vineyards, some small commercial and many residential single family homes and several mobile home parks (home to many elderly residents). In addition, a large apportment structure is nearing completion diagnally to the mapped project and another one north of Esposti Park has just broken ground. Esposti park (where many youth growts take place) is directly across Shiloh Rd. from property and San Miguel Elementary School is less than a mile south on faught Rd. We feel a casino project so close to important youth activities and education would create a danger to our children. We worry that traffic on our narrow roads would be severely impacted for

daily work and school commutes.

The property is adjacent to a beloved regional park, Shiloh Park, preguented by locals and home to native wildlife. This entire area is at high rock for yearly wildfires in summer and fall. We locals face each fire season with serious apprehension since 2017 when the Tubbs fire rossed west from Maps Valley towards us with little to no warning. That night in October 2017 we fled our home in middle night and become refugees - not knowing where we should go. Since then, warning system and evacuation zones have been established but we truly face each fine season with head as these wildland fires have become unpredictable and not easily contained. We feel that it is unispossible to introduce the large number of people a cosino/resort would bring, to The darger of an energency evacuation situation. The additional population would also bring added road congestion, endangering sundending loss residents as well.

The carino resort project would destroy the quality of life of our beloved neighborhood and we are very angry that the project seemed seems like it is being faced upon us! It doesn't seem night that an out of country tribe is partnering with a midwestern tribe to just profit moretainly at our and our land's expense.

We ask The Bureau of Indian affairs to regert a Shiloh Carino project.

>> Hello Chad, I am strongly opposed to this project, and would only support Alternative D - No Action Alternative. Please see my below comments on areas that were not addressed in the Draft Environmental Impact Statement primarily based on the impacts of Alternative A - Proposed Project.

>>

- >> Disingenuous Stated Purpose
- >> The "stated purpose" of proposed action is to facilitate tribal self sufficiency, self determination, and economic development. Considering the size of the tribe is 89 members, 52% who live in Sonoma County, a \$600M casino with estimated \$575M annual revenue is way overkill for the stated purpose. This leads one to believe the stated purpose is disingenuous, and the proposed action is really to create a money-making machine for the few casino senior executives and investment partners, primarily the Chickasaw Nation, with I suspect a small percentage trickling to the tribal members, although probably enough to make them all very wealthy. By comparison, the Graton Resort & Casino, of comparable size to the proposed, has 1,400 members of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria. A project should be more appropriately sized for the number of tribal members.

>>

- >> Employee Challenges
- >> The proposed resort and casino is estimated to employ 1,571 full time employees. The average annual salary according to Salary.com of the Graton Resort & Casino is \$39,520 \$52,000. It's reasonable to assume the proposed resort and casino would pay similar wages. According to the California Department of Housing and Community Development, the median income for a single person living in Sonoma County is \$89,650. <\$70,000 is low income. <\$44,050 is very low income. It's expensive to live in Sonoma County. A recent article in the Press Democrat, the local newspaper, stated according to GOBanking website, a family needs \$144,090 to live comfortably if paying a mortgage, and \$84,823 if paying rent in Sonoma County. The predominantly low and very low incomes to be paid by the proposed resort and casino would not provide a comfortable living for their employees, we don't need more of that in our community.

>>

>> The State of California Employment Development Department indicated a 4.0% unemployment rate as of June 2024 for Sonoma County. This is expected to increase slightly in the next 5 years when the proposed resort and casino would be hiring employees. A Sonoma County Economic Development Board 2023 Workforce Development Survey of local businesses indicated 63% of respondents experienced hiring difficulties, with insufficient number of applications, lack of skills, and reluctance to accept offered wage as primary reasons. The need and lack of employees is evidenced by "Now Hiring" signs posted in many businesses in the local area. Employees will be hard to find for the proposed resort and casino, and 1,571 is

a lot of employees.

>>

- >> Groundwater Depletion
- >> The propose resort and casino is estimated to use 170,000 gallons of fresh water per day, or 62,050,000 per year, or 191 acre feet per year, or enough to support 573 single family households. The testing performed so far has not determined conclusively this huge amount of water usage wouldn't significantly impact the groundwater and wells in the area. The EIS proposes to begin a groundwater monitoring program at least 1 year prior to opening, meaning the project would already have been under construction for 1 year considering a 2 year construction timeline. Additional time would be needed to evaluate results from the monitoring. This is too late to make changes should the groundwater be negatively impacted and should be determined prior to project approval.

>>

- >> Declining Property Values
- >> The EA also states the proposed resort and casino would not significantly impact nearby home property values based on a study of other completed casinos and the property values in a 5 mile radius. It is not realistic to think homes directly adjacent to a \$600M resort and casino operating 24/7 would not be impacted with significantly reduced property values. Who would want to live next to or near such an operation? Housing several miles away would not be as impacted, but that would not be the case for those adjacent to the property who currently enjoy vineyard views.

>

- >> Environmental Setting
- >> The current project site includes 59.3 acres of landscaping, consisting primarily of vineyards and ornamental trees and plants. The site is located approximately 1/2 mile from Shiloh Ranch Regional Park, an 850 acre park with nearly 8 miles of hiking trails with beautiful views of the surrounding areas, including the project site. The park is enjoyed by numerous Sonoma County residents, including myself, as a way to escape the sounds and sights of the city. The visual simulations of Alternative A in the Draft EIS are hugely inaccurate and in no way reflect what a five-story hotel, four-story parking garage, and three-story casino would look like. The proposed project, a 24/7 mammoth resort and casino operation in such close proximity, would completely shatter the ambience of the park, and make it an undesirable hiking and nature enjoyment location. This is not fair to the park patrons and community.

My name is Jan MacInnis and I live in fairly close proximity to the proposed Koi casino in Windsor Ca. I waited for 2 hrs to speak at the forum but couldn't wait any longer so I'm putting my concerns in a letter.

U heard many carpenters tell their story but this casino effects the surrounding neighborhoods more than it does the carpenters!! Many many more people with a huge impact on their lives and their children's lives But more than that their is a big question of NEED!! If I wanted to gamble I could drive 10 minutes south and gamble in another huge casino in Rohnert Park they have over 3000 slots and 120 gaming tables If that didn't suit me I could go 15-20 min north and gamble in the River Rick or Twin Pines casinos. There are more. They have together over 9000 slots and many hundreds of gaming tables. where is the NEED . we don't NEED our families so closely exposed to this addictive behavior. We don't NEED our spouses spending money we don't have gambling what we do have away. We don't NEED an outside group of developers tearing out our beautiful grape vineyards. We don't NEED this so close in to our community We certainly don't NEED the crime it will bring!! This is a small town area and we really want to keep it as close to that for as long as we can so our kids can grow up where we moved for this type of life. Even the local Indian Tribes say they are breaking their own laws. Holy cow folks we don't NEED or WANT you here. Please take this casino back to Colorado where I think this tribe is from. It's truly a question of NEED. I heard that there was one of these casinos struggling to make it. No wonder because there are too many of them. Please listen to some old folks who live right down the street (one-half mile) from the proposed resort and casino. We live in a senior (folks over 55 years old) mobile home park, built in the 60's. The address of the park (Colonial Mobile Home Park) is 5645 Old Redwood Hwy. The park office is 66 Colonial Park Dr. The owners, who are now in their 90's still live here. It is a quiet, relaxing, friendly community. There are 192 mobile homes and 300 residents. I have lived here since 2001.


I watched the zoom meeting with Chad Broussard on July 30th, 2024. I learned a lot and it was very interesting. I was wondering how it would change my life.

The next day, on the NextDoor Neighborhood Website, I was sickened by the comments made by Pam Miller, a Rohnert Park resident-"I live near the Graton Casino. Here is what will happen to your neighborhood: Yes, there will be more traffic. Lots of it. Buses. Tons of buses all day, all night. The vermin will arrive from all over the Bay area to get lucky at the slots, and when they don't, they start hitting the mailboxes, cruising through neighborhoods, and crashing through your fences. You will start finding drug paraphernalia and used condoms in certain areas. Most likely the Home Depot parking lot as well. There will be prostitutes at the shopping centers and elsewhere. The drunk drivers will be taking out your fences, parts of your homes, power poles, etc. You will see nothing about this in the local paper. With any luck, Windsor will negotiate an MOU with the tribe and get a few bucks a year for some asphalt or a new police vehicle. It will be pretty crazy for the first few years, but some of it will calm down. You need to prepare: get locking mailboxes, security cameras, and whatever else makes you feel safe. Talk to your neighbors and look out for each other-even if you don't really get along. They're your neighbors and that means something. Good Luck to you all."

The property to our North is also a senior mobile home park. They have 136 homes. We oldsters are used to driving on our two- lane road with little traffic, except for the farm equipment heading to the local vineyard, little noise, except for the roosters early in the morning. We made it out safely during the Tubbs and Kincade fires. We were without gas for 10 days. We did fine with hot water from our crock pots for cooking or bathing. The great team from Alameda County came to our rescue and reignited our gas.

We're old and tough, but I think that if the comments from Pam Miller are what is to come for us, we will not be enjoying our retirement and final days.

It is currently an immense vineyard (and vital wildfire breaker) situated in a wildish area of Sonoma Count. It's surrounded by homes, a neighborhood and Shiloh Regional Park. I live across the road, due west, in a modest mobile home park. The richness of my life, and value of my home, is intimately connected to the natural wildish environs. The natural terrain, a second Regional Park nearby, and a measure of tranquility is found here (even as more traffic and noise creep in, daily.)

A hotel and casino gaming complex has no place here. I am writing to you as I am a citizen of Windsor, California. I participated on the zoom call on July 30, 2024 at 6 PM. A majority of the people who were on the call were against having a casino built at the proposed location. Both Town Council of Windsor and Santa Rosa are against having a casino built

Here are the many issues brought up:

The Koi Nation is from Clear Lake, CA not from Santa Rosa, CA. They are 60 miles from their native lands. No casino has been built in California farther than 15 miles from their native lands.

The land has always been for Residential, agricultural and limited commercial use as mentioned in your EA report. It has Pruitt Creek that runs through the property and floods every year.

The road is only a two lane road and would cause extreme problems for the citizens who live nearby if and when they have a fire, earthquake or other natural disaster. The proposed casino stated in their Environmental Impact report expects to have approximately 2,000 to 5,000 people traveling on Shiloh Road each day. This could be the equivalent of 2500 cars each day.

The U.S Fish and Wildlife Service has stated the endangered Tiger Salamander, Red Legged Frog, potential issues to coho salmon that can be found throughout Windsor, CA. This was in an article on August 31, 2011 from Patch.com. Measure L mentions this in your report, my question is how do you control habitat needs? What measures are to be taken?

It has been proven that where there is a casino an increase in crime, drunk driving, accidents and more have substantially increased. Currently Santa Rosa and Windsor police forces are understaffed as well as the Sonoma County Sheriff's Department. In your EIS report you mention having best management practices to solve these issues and shall "make best efforts to enter service agreements with the Sheriff and Fire Departments, again there are no guarantees which could result in an increase

The casino will also increase noise, air, lighting and groundwater pollution. This is addressed as only an LS (less than significant) issue. It is very much a *huge* concern to homes and businesses in the surrounding area.

During the proposed construction phase lasting from 2023 until the opening date of 2028, the large construction trucks and workers building from 7 am until 5 pm will create a lot of noise, traffic congestion and increase smog in the area.

The casino will affect local businesses and adjacent casino's. In your report you state there will be an overlap of potential market area and project site. Four casino's affected will be: Graton Resort and Casino, Cache Creek Casino Resort, River Rock Casino and San Pablo Lytton Casino.

Secondary markets that will also be affected are: Twin Pine Casino and Hotel, Coyote Valley Casino and Hotel, Robinson Rancheria Resort and Casino, Konocti Vista Casino Resort and Sherwood Valley Casino.

Regarding housing, property values, schools and businesses near the proposed casino in your, "sensitive receptors" section you state only LS. Growth Inducing Effects as stated in your report state it will have a negative effect on roadways infrastructure, sewer and water services.

It is known that property values go **DOWN between 2-10% near a casino!**They will also be affected by construction noise, night lighting issues, air pollution from all the vehicles, etc.

The needed water of 170,000 gallons per day of potable water and 108,000 gdp of recycled water. Potable water supply would be provided via on-site wells, and recycled water (tertiary treated effluent) would be provided from the on-site wastewater treatment facilities (see Section 2.1.4). Recycled water would be used for toilet and urinal flushing, on-site landscape irrigation, on-site vineyard irrigation, and cooling tower makeup. Fire flow requirements for Alternative A are anticipated to be 2,000 gallons per minute for 4 hours assuming the use of automatic fire sprinklers consistent with applicable requirements of the Tribe's Building and Safety Code of 2023, which are consistent with the California Building Code (CBC, Appendix D-1). as mentioned in 2.1.3 in the report would require several wells at a depth of 700 ft. Currently the surrounding wells on homeowners properties, according to those who spoke on the zoom video, are drying up or are not usable. This brings up many issues, one is where will the casino get water if the wells cannot produce enough to support the casino, hotel and pool? This will impede growth for needed housing, agriculture and other businesses that depend on water.

Another item mentioned in the report is that the casino would be located in a "high fire zone". I did not find where the Koi Nation would be building a fire station nearby. Other major concerns are how to get all the people safely evacuated. Regarding emergencies it is stated you will ONLY have three employees trained as a firefighter and EMT. *This will NOT be enough workers to assist in case of an emergency*

Both the council members of Sonoma County, including Santa Rosa and Windsor are opposed to having this casino built. The Graton and Dry Creek Pomo tribes have also stated they are against the casino. Many callers from union construction companies that were told they would be hired by the Koi Nation were the very few in favor of the casino.

I am hoping the Koi Nation decides to do 3.13.3.5 Alternative D: No Action Alternative

I am writing to express my STRONG opposition to the Koi Nation's proposed project to establish trust land in Windsor, California. I have been a Sonoma County resident since birth, 62 years, and my family has been here for generations. I am also an enrolled member of the Cloverdale Rancheria Pomo Indians of California.

The Koi Nation's historical and cultural connections are in Lake County, they are even currently suing the County to regain their historical sites. Their customs, language, and traditions are distinct from those of the Southern Pomo tribes. The Koi Nation's claims that their historic connections are based on trading interactions are crazy. Trading goods with another tribe does not grant territorial rights. Such interactions were common among tribes but did not imply ownership or rights to the land. Imagine China claiming America is their country because we trade goods with them, would that be allowed?

The Koi Nation has every right to assert their legal rights as an indigenous tribe BUT within their own territory in Lake County. The Sonoma County Tribes have protected and preserved these lands for countless generations. The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) should consider the fact that this is KOI's 3rd attempt to go outside of their historical area, does this not prove they are "reservation shopping" for the best location to make their 90+ members billionaires? What about the true Sonoma County tribes that are indigenous to this area?

This project would have significant effects on the sovereignty of my Tribe and our cultural resources. I urge the BIA to consider alternative project sites for the Koi Nation that do not infringe upon the cultural sovereign lands of other tribes. Protecting tribal sovereignty and cultural resources is not just a legal obligation but a moral one.

I am writing in hopes of sharing I concern over the Environment Impact Statement that was shared with the community of Windsor, CA. I am not a Nor Cal Carpenter Union member nor am I a Native American. I am, however a citizen of the Town Of Windsor who moved here 29 years ago to raise my family. My husband and I were drawn to this are because of the small town charm and caring community.

The EIS presented to the community is lengthy and some part difficult to understand. What I did come away with is the report has not shown the true impact this project will have on not only the community of Windsor but all of Sonoma County. We are already struggling with water shortages and with the current housing/apartment projects already in the works for Windsor it makes this even more of a concern. We are in a fire prone area and have already experienced very congested roadways during evacuations. Have you recently experienced driving in the area of Old Redwood Hwy and Shiloh recently? It's busy and once they finish the projects on Shiloh Rd and Old Redwood Hwy it will be even more so. I don't feel that the EIS covered this toughly. Nor do I feel that it adequately takes in to consideration law enforcement and the safety of our community. I have grandchildren that attend San Miguel School which is less than a mile for this project. People will end up driving down Faught Rd to get to or leave the purposed project.

What about the housing for the employees this project would have to hire? We already have a housing shortage though out Sonoma County!

I do sympathize with the Koi Nation and their quest for useable land. I feel that since they are from Lake County they should seek land in their own homeland as their ancestors have done before them. I understand that they are a tribe of about 90 people and need the assistance of the Chickasaw Nation of Oklahoma in order to bring the this project to completion. Since they have the aid of a well-known tribe they should be able to find and purchase land in their own community, Lake County.

A project such as the Koi Nation Shilo Resort and Casino would have a devastating impact for this community and Sonoma County for so many reasons. If the Koi Nation and the Bureau of Indian Affairs care about the environment and this community, the lives of the people who live and work here then then it would not build this project.

Thank you for this opportunity to submit public comment regarding the Environmental Impact Statement for the proposed Koi Nation Shiloh Resort and Casino Project. I've read the 278 pages of the EIS, as well as most of the supplemental attachments. I oppose this project for the reasons discussed below.

I understand that in 2019, the Koi Nation became a federally recognized tribe, and in 2021 they purchased the 68 acre vineyard adjacent to Windsor, CA. The Koi Nation intends to establish this site as their sovereign land.

The problem? They don't plan on living there according to the EIS. They plan on building a massive casino complex that will bring thousands of daily visitors, gamblers, vacationers, partiers, and concertgoers, (requiring over a thousand employees), to an agricultural property that contains a vineyard with seasonal waterway (Pruitt Creek, a tributary to the Russian River). The site is also next to neighborhoods with many homes, and in close proximity to apartments with families and kids. A county regional park (Shiloh, Regional Park) frequented by hikers, cyclists, and equestrians, and a family friendly park (Esposti Park) with two baseball fields for Little Leaguers and sports teams are right across the street. On an average weekend, the Esposti parking lot can be full.

We understand the Koi Tribe lost their homeland in Clear Lake generations ago and many tribe members have been residing in other areas such as Sebastopol and Santa Rosa. They want a place to call home. Of course that is understandable.

But a home is NOT a 68 acre casino complex that consists of a 400 (or 200) room hotel, multiple restaurants, gaming facilities, spa, entertainment theater, parking garage for thousands of cars, with a waste water treatment plant, etc.. The Koi resort project will be a cooperative business venture with the Chickasaw from Oklahoma.

This planned resort, which is supposed to reclaim a sovereign place for the Koi to call home, is not only going to cause profound harm to the land and environment, it will also put the surrounding roadways, neighborhoods and recreational parks at risk. The EIS is required to delve deeply into these risks and determine the extent of the harm and explore possible mitigation strategies. Reading through this extensive report, it is obvious that there are too many sources of harm to be mitigated. ("Best Management Practices" are not mitigation and will not render the impacts "less than significant.")

This proposed Koi project will significantly impact air quality, water resources (i.e. well water depletion), crime rates, Pruitt Creek contamination, traffic circulation, fire evacuation, public services, and cause noise and light pollution. No amount of mitigation will change these facts.

A massive casino complex must not be erected on this site (identified as Alternative A and B). Neither should Alternative C - "the non-gaming alternative" which consists of a 200 room hotel with 20,000 sq ft. winery, 5,000 sq ft. visitors' center, spa, restaurant, water purification and wastewater treatment facility, and parking lots. And since the Koi will be partnering with the Chickasaw, who own and operate 23 casinos in Oklahoma, including WinStar World Casino and Resort in Thackerville, Oklahoma (perhaps the largest casino in the world), how long will it be before Alternative C is turned into Alternative A or B?

A strong indication that Alternative A or B is the plan of the Chickasaw can be seen in their business model and simply by following the money. For the Koi Nation (a small Pomo band of 90 members) to purchase a 68-acre vineyard in Windsor created some questions at the outset. In January 2022, Koi leaders revealed a predevelopment agreement with the Chickasaw Nation whereby Global Gaming Solutions— a wholly owned Chickasaw business— would partner with the Koi to construct a \$600 million dollar casino resort and also manage and operate the facility.

Chickasaw Nation Governor, Bill Anoatubby, commented:

"The Chickasaw Nation is pleased to play a role in this project, and we look forward to a successful collaboration.... The prosperity of our citizens and a commitment to working together with our partners in the Koi Nation as well as local, state, and community officials are key components to our mission. We look forward to witnessing new jobs, additional businesses, and increased tourism to this region." https://sbcamericas.com/2022/01/25/koi-nation-partners-with-chickasaw-nation-for-planned-shiloh-casino-in-california/

Additional businesses? Increased tourism? New jobs to the area? What about everything that comes with that? Is this what we want for our town? This project will catapult the Town of Windsor into something unrecognizable and unnecessary, environmentally harmful, and potentially dangerous, especially when we have another evacuation.

This project is opposed by all our Windsor Town Council members, Sonoma County Supervisors James Gore and Lynda Hopkins, State Senator Mike McGuire, U.S. Rep, Jared Huffman, and most recently, Governor Gavin Newsom (see attached letter dated August 18th, released from Gov. Newsom's office).

Option D, "No action alternatives" would allow the land to remain in its existing condition and not taken into trust "for the foreseeable future." No environmental effects would occur. Pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act's 40 CFR section 1502.14[f], Alternative D was determined to be the environmentally preferred alternative.

It is imperative that the Koi procure an alternative site to pursue their business objectives "in order to best meet the tribe's objectives and provide the greatest socioeconomic benefit to the Tribe and the surrounding community." (quote from EIS Section 2- Comparison to the Alternatives 2.5 p. 2-28)

I have lived in Windsor since 1987. When our town was incorporated in 1992, a community separator and Urban Growth Boundary was established to provide critical open space directly south of town (now the location of the proposed casino project). This open space proved to be a vital firebreak during the Kincade fire in 2019 that threatened to destroy most of Windsor. The flames came within a half mile of our neighborhood on East Shiloh.

It is my prayer and fervent intention that objective logic and clear vision will prevail, and the BIA will not allow this land to be taken into trust for these project alternatives.

The neighbors of southeast Windsor are exercising our rights as property owners, voters, taxpayers, and stewards of our land. We remain firmly dedicated to opposing this development so we may continue to enjoy a safe and peaceful environment for our families, our community, and our longtime neighbors.

We support the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria and the Dry Creek Rancheria of Pomo Indians that own and operate the Graton Casino and River Rock Casino, respectively, in Sonoma County.

Some final questions:

- What federal, state or local protections will the environment have if this land is taken into trust?
- Who would monitor the environmental impact on an ongoing basis?
- What steps can be taken by any jurisdiction if environmental requirements are not followed?
- What sort of legal precedent will be set if the Chickasaw Nation is allowed to get a foothold into the gaming industry in Sonoma County and California?

Thank you for your time on this critical matter.



Dear Assistant Secretary Newland:

On behalf of Governor Gavin Newsom, I write to urge the U.S. Department of the Interior not to move forward with the Shiloh Resort and Casino Project in Sonoma County and the Scotts Valley Casino and Tribal Housing Project in Solano County.

Governor Newsom and his Administration are grateful for the opportunity to share our perspective on these projects, as we are grateful to the Department for its thoughtful and constructive engagement in a wide range of other contexts. Our concerns about these specific projects, and their specific procedural pathway, should not be understood as a criticism of the Department's broader practice of taking land into trust for tribal governments—including, in appropriate cases, the Department's practice of (and time-tested procedures for) taking land into trust for gaming. The Governor recognizes the important role that this practice can play in supporting tribes' political sovereignty and economic self-sufficiency.

At the same time, however, caution is warranted when considering the potential expansion of gaming to land that is not currently eligible for gaming. This is particularly true in California, where the voters who legalized tribal gaming

were promised that such gaming would remain geographically limited. This historical context underscores the importance of striking a careful balance between the potential benefits of expanded tribal gaming and its potential impacts on surrounding communities.

Federal law contains important safeguards that have previously helped the Department strike this delicate balance. As a starting point, federal law generally prohibits gaming on new land taken into trust for a tribe, unless the land is linked to the tribe's preexisting reservation. 25 U.S.C. § 2719(a). The principal exception to this rule carefully safeguards local interests (including the interests of local tribes), allowing gaming only where the Department has determined not only that such gaming would be in the best interest of the gaming tribe, but also that it "would not be detrimental to the surrounding community"—and only where the relevant state's governor concurs in that determination. 25 U.S.C. § 2719(b)(1)(A). Governor Newsom discharges this responsibility with the utmost care, and has previously exercised this power in a manner that supports both tribal self-sufficiency and the interests of surrounding communities. See, e.g., Letter from Governor Gavin Newsom to Bryan Newland, Assistant Secretary – Indian Affairs (June 13, 2022). The Governor appreciates the opportunity to engage in this important process, which appropriately balances the sovereign interests of states and tribes.

Here, however, the Governor is concerned that the Department might depart from this familiar procedure and its important safeguards. In their current form, these two projects propose to rely on a different statutory provision that allows gaming on land taken into trust—without a two-part determination or the Governor's concurrence—as part of "the restoration of lands for an Indian tribe that is restored to Federal recognition." 25 U.S.C. § 2719(b)(1)(B)(iii). Make no mistake: the Governor recognizes the profound moral value of restoring a tribe's control over its aboriginal homeland. Care must be taken, however, to ensure that this "restored lands" exception—like all exceptions—remains within appropriate limits. The "restored lands" exception must not be construed so broadly as to "give restored tribes an open-ended license to game on newly acquired lands." Redding Rancheria v. Jewell, 776 F.3d 706, 711 (9th Cir. 2015). On the contrary: "In administering the restored lands exception, the Secretary needs to ensure that tribes do not take advantage of the exception to expand gaming operations unduly and to the detriment of other tribes' gaming operations." Id.

As explained below, neither of these two proposed projects fits within the limits of the "restored lands" exception.

As to the Shiloh Resort and Casino Project, the Koi Nation of Northern California lacks sufficient historical connection to the Windsor parcel to support the "restored lands" exception. The Windsor parcel does not fall within the Koi Nation's aboriginal homeland: it lies approximately fifty miles, over winding mountain roads, from the Lake County region where (as the Koi Nation acknowledges) "the Koi Nation's ancestors had villages and sacred sites along the shores of Clearlake since time immemorial." Koi Nation's Opening Brief at 11, Koi Nation of Northern California v. City of Clearlake, No. A169438 (Cal. Ct. App. Apr. 30, 2024). The assertion that the Koi Nation sometimes used trade routes or otherwise obtained resources near modern-day Windsor cannot change this basic fact: such transient uses do not show the kind of sustained, durable presence that would be necessary to support the view that the proposed project represents a "restoration." Nor can it matter that individual members of the Koi Nation voluntarily resided in Sonoma County during the twentieth century. If the presence of individual members in modern times were conflated with a tribe's control over its aboriginal homeland, for purposes of the "restored lands" exception, the exception could swallow the rule—which, as the Ninth Circuit has warned, it must not do. See Redding Rancheria, 776 F.3d at 711.

The Scotts Valley Casino and Tribal Housing Project raises similar concerns. Like the Koi Nation, the Scotts Valley Band has its aboriginal homeland in modern-day Lake County. Like the Koi Nation, the Scotts Valley Band lacks the deep and enduring connection to the relevant territory (here, the Vallejo parcel) necessary to invoke the "restored lands" exception. And here again, the nearby presence of specific individuals, late in history, must not be conflated with the Tribe's collective control over its aboriginal homeland. Nor can an 1851 treaty—apparently purporting to cede a vast swath of the North Bay, Sacramento Valley, and Clear Lake regions—produce a different result. Cf. Scotts Valley Band of Pomo Indians v. Dep't of the Interior, 633 F. Supp. 3d 132, 168 (D.D.C. 2022). Nineteenth-century treaties were hardly models of respect for tribal sovereignty, and one cannot safely assume that they accurately reflect the boundaries of tribes' aboriginal homelands.

The Department's interpretation of the "restored lands" exception further counsels against applying that exception to the Scotts Valley project. The Department has construed the "restored lands" exception to require one or more "modern connections" between the tribe and the land. 25 C.F.R. § 292.12(a). In the context of the Scotts Valley project, no such modern connection is apparent. On the contrary, the Environmental Assessment appears to recognize that the Scotts Valley Band has no presence in Solano County: the Environmental Assessment notes that the Band's members "span[] across Alameda, Contra Costa, Lake, Mendocino, and Sonoma Counties," while omitting any reference to Solano. Envtl. Assessment at 1-2. Under the Department's view of the "restored lands" exception, embodied in its regulations, this lack of "modern connections" provides an additional reason not to use the exception to proceed with the Scotts Valley project.

Nor can the so-called "Indian canon" stretch the limits of the "restored lands" exception to encompass these two projects. *Cf. Scotts Valley Band*, 633 F. Supp. 3d at 166–68. Although that canon sometimes allows statutory ambiguity to be resolved in favor of tribal sovereignty, it has no application where—as here—"all tribal interests are not aligned." *Reading Rancheria*, 776 F.3d at 713. "An interpretation of the restored lands exception that would benefit [a] particular tribe, by allowing unlimited use of restored land for gaming purposes, would not necessarily benefit other tribes also engaged in gaming." *Id.* Here, other local tribes—tribes who truly have called the relevant lands home since time immemorial—are steadfast in their opposition to these projects. "The canon should not apply in such circumstances." *Id.*

Finally, misplaced reliance on the "restored lands" exception, in the context of these two projects, also risks leading the Department astray under the National Environmental Policy Act. As explained above, the Windsor parcel and the Vallejo parcel fall far outside the aboriginal homelands of the Koi Nation and the Scotts Valley Band, respectively. In focusing on those two parcels, the Department has thus far failed to consider whether the purposes of the proposed projects could be served by sites within the Tribes' aboriginal homelands—which is to say that the Department has, thus far, failed to adequately consider reasonable geographic alternatives as required by NEPA. See 'llio'ulaokalani Coal. v. Rumsfeld, 464 F.3d 1083, 1097–1101 (9th Cir. 2006).

Governor Newsom has deep respect for tribal sovereignty, and he has been proud to restore tribes' control over lands from which they have been dispossessed. Here, however, he is concerned by the prospect that the Department might invoke the "restored lands" exception to support projects that are focused less on restoring the relevant tribes' aboriginal homelands, and more on creating new gaming operations in desirable markets. If the Department were to embrace this view of the "restored lands" exception, it is far from obvious that the "exception" would retain a clear and durable limiting principle. This prospect is particularly troubling in California, where the voters who approved tribal gaming were promised that such gaming would remain carefully limited—including by federal law and its geographic restrictions on the categories of land open to gaming.

Governor Newsom is committed to working with tribal governments, and the Department, to support tribes' self-determination and economic development. In appropriate cases, the Governor stands ready to exercise his authority, under federal law, to concur in the Department's decision to take land into trust for gaming. Here, however, he is concerned that these specific projects are proceeding in a manner that would sidestep the State, ignore the concerns of tribal governments and other local communities, and stretch the "restored lands" exception beyond its legal limits—while failing to adequately consider whether there might be a better way. On behalf of the Governor, I urge the Department not to move forward with these proposed projects.

I am a Tribal Citizen of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria (FIGR), located within the Wine Country of Sonoma County and I vehemently oppose the Koi Nation (a Lake County Pomo tribe from more than 50 miles away), applying for Fee-to-Trust status to take land from *our* ancestral territory—for the purpose, not only of a reservation far from their original home, but to establish a casino *in my backyard* to directly compete with two tribal casinos already established within a 20-mile radius from me.

I was born and raised here in the heart of Wine Country—this is a county of limited space, unaffordable housing, prime agricultural land and rampant wine tourism. It's a place I've witnessed change beyond recognition from the humble farming community I roamed on horseback as a child. There is no room here for reservation shopping and unlimited casinos. This project is proposed on an intersection between single family homes and open vineyards in the small, congested Town of Windsor. I cannot think of a more inappropriate place to build any kind of large commercial project, even by a tribe that actually belongs here.

Setting a precedent that is opposite to a long standing tribal and federal government tradition is a dangerous affair, with repercussions for both sides. This is an attempt to erode tribal sovereignty—historically not a new concept. However, this tribe nor the ones funding or supporting them seem to realize the consequences of losing our status as sovereign nations. No, money and greed is the motivator here—not the history nor honor of our ancestors. Allowing tribes to take land into trust for casinos wherever their members traveled for work or trade means that our own tribe could establish a casino in San Francisco. Is that what the BIA really wants? Tribes across wide geographical areas traded regularly with each other and socialized/married outside of their immediate point of origin, but that does not mean that was their home—the same way traveling to France does not automatically make you a citizen. My own grandparents met traveling on the road picking hops and prunes; sometimes living in different areas for extended periods for work—but they knew where Home was. This action would also infringe on the cultural, historical, and territorial rights of other tribes in Sonoma County such as the Dry Creek, Lytton, and Cloverdale Rancherias and drastically impact any future economic projects they should pursue.

The DOI is obligated to uphold the existing laws established by the long tribal and federal government relations. The Koi Nation must also follow these laws and seek a reservation in their own ancestral territory, in their true and original homeland of Lake County. This is something we were required to do as well. It should be no different for any other tribe.

The pandemic pancaked this state, which depends on people flying in to congregate in casinos and entertainment venues. This is a strange state, and not just because its biggest industry is what locals call "gaming," and what, until relatively recently, most Americans considered sinful. Las Vegas's Clark County contains 70% of Nevadans. More than 80% of the state's land is owned by the U.S. government.

Las Vegas is a 24-hour town,

and voters can be difficult for public opinion pollsters to reach by phone. This is a booming city of transients, with many people moving in and a substantial number moving on. 

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

- 5. This location is not near the Koi Nation's home. That is 48 miles away in Lake County. No other tribe has built a development farther than 15 miles from their home. This is a terrible precedent to set.
- 6. Sam Salmon, former mayor of Windsor and now on the town council, suggested that the suitable land for this development was on the vacant land south of Home Depot on the south side of Shiloh Rd. Easy access, wide road and just off Hwy 101. Not this location far from the freeway and through residential development.

I am vehemently opposed to the casino that is proposed for the Shiloh Road area. I am a 30+ year resident of Sonoma County and do NOT see the need for another casino. We have plenty of casinos here and the Rohnert Park, Graton Casino already has plans for expansion. We have a Casino to the north (River Rock) and several in the southern end of Sonoma County. It appears to me that Rohnert Park has experienced an increase in crime, homelessness, and general vagrancy since the Graton Casino was built. It definitely has endured an increase in the number of visitors to the area and I do not view that in a positive light as the visitors are not frequenting other businesses outside of the Casino campus. They have huge busses that bring people in from outside the area. I do NOT see this as a plus for our county.

Specifically, in regard to the Shiloh Road proposal, the Town of Windsor will be most seriously impacted - again NOT in a positive manner. More cars, more crime, increased public safety expenses without the benefit of increased revenues (the casino is actually in Santa Rosa vs. Windsor). This is my third letter opposing the proposed Shiloh Resort & Casino Project for the following reasons:

- 1. Our neighborhood is in the Oak Park subdivision built in the late 1980"s & is right across Shiloh Rd from the proposed project in a semi rural area.
- The project will be across the street from a park where youth sports are played & families play & have picnics & also across from a church which has food banks & gamblers anonymous meetings.
- 3. It is within 2 blocks of another church on Shiloh Rd.
- 4. We already have water rationing during dry years. How would there be enough water for this project which will supposedly use a minimum of 280,000 gallons of water per day. We would have to let our landscaping die that we've spent thousands of dollars on.
- Our power grid is already taxed & barely enough to support the existing homes & businesses.
- 6. We've had to evacuate 3 times in the last few years due to wild fires & its been challenging due to traffic & the fact there's only one way out. With this project in place it would be a nightmare & lives could possibly be lost.
- 7. This was a sought after neighborhood prior to the casino scare & now houses are taking a lot longer to sell & at lower values.
- 8. Shiloh Rd is a 2 lane road. The traffic is already bad enough without the casino. The project will ruin this semi rural area.
- 9. The sewer systems would be overwhelmed.
- There are already 2 casinos within 15 miles of this area. One north & on south.
- 11. The Tribe that wants to build this casino are not from Sonoma County & neither is the Oklahoma Tribe supporting them.

12. I've talked to law enforcement working near the other casino's in this county & they all say crime has definitely increased.



A traffic report was conducted in 2021, which, was before the two enormous apartment complexes were being built, one on Shiloh Rd and one on Old Redwood Highway. These structures will indeed heighten the problem of getting people evacuated from the area should a fire or other catastrophe arise. Also, the impact report was done during the covid pandemic when people were not as mobile as they are now. At the very least there needs to be another analysis and report after these structures are finished. Fire in our area is of the upmost concern and the roads leading to this project are inadequate for the citizens that are living in the area now not to mention if there are another 1000 plus cars at the intersections trying to get to highway 101.

Another concern is about security and safety to the neighborhoods surrounding the project. I am specifically commenting on the Traffic Impact Study (TIS) as presented in Appendix I of the EIS (publication July 2024).

I noted that the turning movement data for Existing Traffic Conditions in Section 3.1 of Appendix I were collected on January 28, 2022 and January 30, 2022. Then Average Daily Trip (ADT) data was collected on July 28, 2022.

The first problem is that Section 3.1 notes January 30, 2022 as a "Saturday". When January 30, 2022 was a Sunday. So a correction needs to be made one way or the other.

I believe that the EIS 2022 TIS traffic data is now too old to be used for this EIS analysis for the following reasons.

- 1. First, 2022 was not that long after the Covid pandemic, during which many local businesses were still encouraging and allowing work from home. This decreased the 2022 daily trips throughout this region of Sonoma County, but has now (2024) rebounded to pre-pandemic levels and possibly higher.
- 2. Second, it is not clear whether the TIS incorporated traffic counts from the currently constructing Shiloh Crossing apartment development located at 295 Shiloh Road. The project includes a total of 173 apartments and 8,000 square feet of commercial

space. Other approved development projects and their expected trip counts should also be incorporated into the existing traffic conditions.

3. ADT counts were taken in July of 2022. This is a season when schools are typically not in session, nor are many after-school activities. A better peak time for ADT counts would have been in April or September of a given year.

Therefore, I request that the EIS perform a new TIS which includes recent traffic counts and incorporates expected new development within the project study area. I believe new traffic counts will show that some intersections and queue storage will fall below the LOS standards set for this EIS and will have a significant unmitigated impact.

I believe the trip distribution and assignment assumptions of Section 4.3 do not align with my observations, being a resident of this immediate area for the past 17 years. I would like to know how the trip distribution and assignment percentages were calculated. I would think that the percentage of trip generation from 101 to the south would be far higher than 45 percent.

I would also like to know how the traffic counts were conducted, whether through video detection, pneumatic tubes, or other. If through video detection, I would like to know specifically where the cameras were placed, as improper placement can affect the quality of the traffic count data.

Dear Ms. Dutschke and Mr. Broussard,

I am writing as a direct neighbor to the proposed Koi Nation Shiloh Resort and Casino. By direct, I mean directly across Old Redwood Highway from the southeast corner of the intended property. I am a resident of one of the two mobile home parks that are next door neighbors to each other - Mobile Home Estates and Colonial Park, with Pruitt Creek running between the two parks.

I DO NOT WANT THIS CASINO!

The <u>GENERAL</u> <u>NEIGHBORHOOD ENVIRONMENT</u> will be ruined for the residents of this unincorporated area and the entire town of Windsor. This is not the area/neighborhood for a development such as this. Currently, it is a residential/semi-rural/agricultural area. There are many single family homes adjacent to a popular town park, Esposti Park, at the intersection of Shiloh East and Old Redwood Highway that is used for little league baseball, soccer, family picnics and a stopping point for many cyclists traveling Old Redwood Highway. There is a County Regional Park also adjacent to the east of the site, used by residents from all over for hiking, dog walking, horseback riding. Both these parks add to the general family friendly atmosphere of the area. A casino will not add to this atmosphere that has been purposely cultivated with the current amenities.

WATER is an issue all over California and the surrounding properties mainly get their water from a well. A development of this size will negatively impact the water availability for all wells in the area. This includes the town of Windsor that currently has 2 wells located at Esposti Park that are used for municipal drinking waster and irritation. Mitigation payments to other private parties who have reduced water from their wells will not replace the water...you can't drink money! Additionally, between the two mobile home parks mentioned above runs Pruitt Creek. My understanding is there are plans for the casino to release wastewater into Pruitt Creek. Please note this creek is dry much of the year and floods during heavy rain. Is it also true that part of this creek, that also flows on the proposed casino site, will be rerouted and/or paved over? Is: any of this responsible creek or source water stewardship? I think not.

<u>LIGHT, AIR AND NOISE POLLUTION.</u> A 24/7 lighted facility with a 400 room hotel, 5000 parking spaces and additional structures will add noise, light and air pollution that will disrupt the local population of people and wildlife.

TRAFFIC will be an issue. My understanding is the traffic study was completed during Covid when people were not going out as usual. How can that be used as an accurate measure for traffic impact? Old Redwood Highway is used as a second Highway 101 all day long! It is already difficult to exit or enter my park with the traffic, especially during the morning and all afternoon into the evening. Proposed widening of Shiloh and Old Redwood Highway are not part of the cost which will be born by the casino and most traffic mitigation suggested is inadequate and unrealistic. This doesn't even touch on the issue of needing to evacuate should there be another fire - which is almost inevitable. Evacuation during the Kincade fire was next to impossible, with Old Redwood Highway, Shiloh, Hembree, etc and Highway 101 backed up, bumper to bumper in every direction. Add another 500 - 2,000 cars, depending on day and time of day and it will be impossible to manage! Remember, power was/will most likely be out and traffic and street lights weren't/won't be working! Traffic control will most likely not be available from Highway Patrol, County Sheriff, or town police - they will elsewhere.

Increased <u>CRIME</u> will be an issue. Statistics show, and we know firsthand from the Graton Casino, that crime is a factor. DUIs, drugs, public intoxication, prostitution, human trafficking, etc. will be introduced into our pleasant community. Who will bear the brunt of this or the cost to town and county policing services, or even for Highway Patrol?

HEALTHCARE will be impacted and felt by the local medical facilities, already stretched thin at Sutter Memorial Hospital and Kaiser, many still struggling after loosing doctors and other medical professionals who left after losing homes in recent fires and the toll that Covid wreaked. This will impact all locals who rely on these services.

The <u>POWERGRID</u> will suffer! With climate change, our hot days are hotter and more frequent. AC usage already causes stress on our power grid and power outages will only get more frequent. The power used by the casino will drag an already fragile system and most likely cause rate hikes for this locals.

I'd also like to note:

- The tribes of Sonoma County, mainly the Graton and Lytonn Rancherias are opposed because the Koi's tribal land is in Lake County, not Sonoma.
- The mayor and town council of Windsor are opposed.
- Our state representatives, Jared Huffman and Mike Thompson are opposed.
- CA State Senator Alex Padilla and former State Senator Dianne Feinstein are opposed.

I urge the BIA to NOT APPROVE this project moving forward, Plan D in the EIS. I also urge the Koi Nation to consider building in Lake County to improve the employment opportunities and other benefits a casino might bring to their own tribal land.

My name is Tsim Schneider. I'm an enrolled Citizen of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria, the federally recognized tribe of Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo people whose ancestors faced and survived multiple phases of colonial violence and displacement by missionaries, soldiers, and settlers from Spain, Mexico, Russia, and the United States. I am also an Associate Professor of Anthropology at the University of California, Santa Cruz, where I teach courses on archaeology, colonialism, and Indigenous peoples of California. I am writing to protest Koi Nation's proposal to build a resort and casino at 222 E. Shiloh Road in Santa Rosa, California. To be certain, I have no issue with Koi Nation exercising their sovereign rights under federal law to obtain economic independence and support Koi Nation community membership. I am calling into question Koi Nation's performance of sovereignty on – and cultural and historical claims to – Indigenous land that is not theirs but is instead a known place within the traditional territory of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria, the federally recognized Tribe of Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo people.

Our history and connection to that place and the surrounding area are unquestionable. Since time immemorial the societies and economies of Coast Miwok speaking peoples and Southern Pomo peoples intersected amicably along the Russian River corridor, Laguna Santa Rosa, and Santa Rosa Plain. As documented by ethnographers, outsiders (neighboring Pomo, Wappo, and others) may have been granted safe passage to the coast and permission to gather food and raw material. However, these interactions were ephemeral, and they do not represent deep ties or equivalent claims to the land. The Koi Nation presents a "Pomo expansion model" to argue their "primacy" in southern Mendocino County and northern Sonoma County. The model attests to the ancient history of Pomo peoples and a homebase in the eastern Clear Lake basin. The archaeological and linguistic evidence appear to suggest a migration of Pomo peoples west from Clear Lake toward the Russian River around 2,500 years ago, representing the beginning of new and different Southern and Southwest Pomo cultural traditions and distinct languages. This evidence does not give the modern Koi Nation of eastern Lake County the right to now claim the spaces that their distant (and distinct) relatives occupied for at least 2,500 years. It would be similar to someone who speaks Turkish claiming land in France because Anatolian languages were the first to split from a shared Proto Indo-European language family. In this instance, supporting Koi

Nation's startling claims would harmfully overwrite the unique histories, languages, and cultures of the Southern and Southwest Pomo peoples. A dangerous precedent for California Indian Country would also be set.

The Shiloh Road property is part of a place that reflects the unique postcontact history of our Tribe, not Koi Nation. As my research shows, my Tribe is one with ancient and unassailable ties to the land—a territory where our ancestors are buried, where our traditions are kept alive, and where our families continue to gather in community. Koi Nation's website presents a history of Euro-American contact and colonization centered on their traditional home 50+ miles away in eastern Lake County during the mid- to late-1800s, a brutal era of United States settler colonialism and military violence. "As a result," they state, "the Koi Pomo then came to live in communities along the Russian River Valley from Sebastopol to Clear Lake"—a known place, the statement overlooks, for Southern Pomo and Coast Miwok families who have always called it home. Since the late-1700s, by contrast, the ancestors of present-day Graton Rancheria Citizens faced and resisted - sequential waves of Euro-American colonization by representatives of Spain. Mexico. Russia, and the United States. For each iteration of greed, land theft, and violence, our ancestors remained connected to their traditional lands and cultural traditions, and they sustained those connections even while families were being pulled apart. Some fled San Francisco Bay missions seeking protection in their traditional lands. Others evaded wandering padres and soldiers—intruders bent on taking away our land, our bodies and spirits, and our way of life. Still others negotiated settler court systems to gain title to land at Olompali and Nicasio, or defiantly remained living on family homesteads before being gathered together as "homeless Indians" at the Graton Rancheria in the early 1900s.

Tsupu, an ancestor for many Graton Rancheria Citizens including me, fled Rancho Petaluma for the Russian mercantile colony of Fort Ross on the Sonoma County coast sometime between 1834 (when Rancho Petaluma was established) and 1841 (when Fort Ross was sold). To do so and to evade capture, Tsupu chose a route as only a local with knowledge of the land would have been able to do. Her survival and her traditional cultural and ecological knowledge of the land paved the way for her children and grandchildren. More recently, one of Tsupu's great grandkids (and my great grandmother) was born to a Coast Miwok father and a mother who proudly identified as "Pomo" on the 1928 "California Indian Enrollment Application" and hailed from the Healdsburg area (approximately 10 miles north of Shiloh Road). Photographs of family get-togethers at the Russian River and other southern Sonoma County places in the early 1900s—indeed the entire Graton Rancheria Tribe of Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo people—reflect all of the places our ancestors lived, worked, resisted, and remained connected to at all cost. **The history I know, as a Native person and a professional anthropologist, is not Koi history.**

Koi Nation's proposal dishonors the locally-specific Native history of that Southern Pomo place as well as the sovereignty of the rightful descendants, the Federated Indians of Graton of Rancheria, who continue to honor their history and steward their traditional territory of southern Sonoma and Marin counties. In simple terms, 222 E. Shiloh Road is not their land.

I am a Tribal Citizen of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria and the purpose of this letter is to express my opposition to the Koi Nation of Northern California's project to establish trust land for gaming in Sonoma County, California.

The Koi Nation, previously known as the Lower Lake Rancheria, submitted a restored lands gaming application to the U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI) for a parcel located outside the Town of Windsor, in Sonoma County. The proposed project location is over a 50-mile drive from the Koi Nation's ancestral and cultural roots in the Lower Lake area of Lake County, where its historic rancheria was located.

DOI is supposed to protect tribal sovereignty and this precedent setting proposal by the Koi Nation is actually *undoing* tribal sovereignty. DOI is now being put in the position of pitting Indians against Indians here in California. Our tribes were not removed from their ancestral homelands, like tribes in Oklahoma. In California, tribes were not removed, but were decimated in place. As my Tribe and others rebuild, our Tribal Citizens are returning to their ancestral territories.

DOI must consider an alternative location for the Koi Nation in their true homeland in Lake County. DOI would be wrong to allow for Koi Nation to jump into another tribe's territory by trying to demonstrate a significant historical connection to our Southern Pomo territory based on trade routes or one family moving to our territory. Koi Nation's application is simply a new twist on their previous efforts to acquire gaming sites *outside* of their ancestral territory, which DOI was correct to deny on the same grounds.

I was also raised in Windsor, I was in the first kindergarten class, the family home is still on Wall Street in Windsor which I go to monthly. We still have family functions there and my family is buried in the Shiloh cemetery which I pass on my way to Wall Street. To avoid the crowded 101 freeway I will often use Old Redwood Highway to Shiloh Road. This is the area where the Koi Nation wants to claim as their land. There is a lot of traffic on this road because it is the alternative to using the 101 freeway and to enter and exit the 101 freeway. It is close to a large Walmart shopping center, the large county park, a baseball park, a very large apartment complex that was recently built, not to mention many homes, mobile home parks, apartments and businesses in the area. I have relatives that live in this area. One relative finds it difficult to exit the blacktopped road from her house to Shiloh Rd near the Walmart shopping center.

The EIS lacks information regarding water, traffic, evacuation for fire or smoke. I had to evacuate in Santa Rosa in 2019 or 2021 and I was scared because the roads were at a standstill. That area was bad in 2017 when the fire came over that mountain. It was bad for evacuating then, there is now a big apartment

complex on Shiloh and Old Redwood Highway and I understand that another is being built. What will happen when 5,000 additional cars are added plus the additions of cars from the apartment complexes try to evacuate. Another apartment complex is also being added to that area. My nephew and his family live in a subdivision off Faught Road. There is so much in that area that has not been included in the EIS. The EIS in inaccurate, the help from local fire departments is inadequate. A family member lost his home in the 2017 fire and several other tribal members lost their home. It was horrible. A casino does not belong in such an impacted area.

The plan is to put in 7 wells as an answer to water. We just went through a drought crisis last year. We used to have a well on Wall Street until we got hooked up to the city water. People still have wells in the area of the proposed casino. Some people with wells said when vineyards came in the vineyard owners were able to dig further down for water and in the times of drought, their wells had problems with getting water. What's going to happen when 7 wells are put in and are able to dig further down. The worry is, will the homes in the area have sufficient water and pressure to put out a fire when there is a drought. It's frightening because all of us in this area have gone through this. This is now considered a dense area with small roads, many people still on wells.

I would greatly appreciate you considering another location for the Koi Nation casino in their ancestral territory in Lake County because of all the reasons I have stated. Otherwise, this project should be denied.

I have been a resident of Sonoma County for 25+ years in the vicinity of the proposed Koi Nation Shilo Resort and Casino at:

5388 Marigold Lane Santa Rosa, CA 95403

I was at home the night of the Tubbs fire in 2017 and I was a volunteer with the American Red Cross at the time. That wildfire was a weather driven event as the weather took a strange turn that night. That evening I received a call from the Red Cross to report to the office to volunteer to help with setting up an evacuation shelter in Calistoga. After an hour of volunteering I received an emergency notification from the county that my residence address was to be evacuated. I went home and helped my wife evacuate our house with our pets in her vehicle. I will never forget the bright orange sky with the fire heading west over the hill just southeast of Shiloh park. There was a continuous barrage of propane tank explosions in the background and it was clear the fire was heading our direction. She headed south to her brother's house across town and I told her to call me when she arrived. I went back to the Red Cross and was reassigned to assist with the evacuation shelter operation at the Finley Center in Santa Rosa. My wife took several hours to head across town to arrive at her brother's house for a trip that normally takes 15 minutes due to traffic on the road with everyone heading away from the fire. It took an hour+ for me to get to the evacuation shelter at the Finley Center that night when normally that would also only take 15 minutes. I was assigned traffic duty on the road outside the Finley Center to instruct people where to go depending on if they were going to enter the shelter or continue heading west or south and find somewhere else to go. Traffic on the two lane road was essentially a parking lot moving at 10 mph maximum due the large number of cars trying to escape the fire. Mind you this was after midnight on a Sunday and the traffic jam lasted until the hour just before dawn. That night and the days that followed I heard numerous reports from my neighbors in the Shiloh, Larkfield, Wikiup area stating they drove through the flames to evacuate the fire and in some cases were stuck in slow traffic while doing so.

Imagine my surprise to learn that there is interest in adding a resort and casino potentially adding a high number of people/vehicles in the same area where it was already difficult to evacuate a wildfire with limited evacuation routes based on my experience that night and other wildfire evacuations since 2017.

I read the EIS and was very interested in the mitigation plan for wildfire evacuation. I was extremely disappointed to learn there was no mitigation to plan for more vehicles on the road during an evacuation. I was hoping to read some civil engineering type studies about taking A hours for x number of vehicles to evacuate a given neighborhood and that the casino/resort

would add an estimate of y number of vehicles and it would that an additional B hours to evacuate the (x + y) vehicles. I would also like to see a plan that would estimate at C hours where someone's life was at risk because they were stuck during the evacuation. I did not see such detailed analysis.

Based on the current EIS, my experience, and no details on would adding this much population to the area put human life at risk in the event of a wildfire disaster I cannot support the plan for the Koi Nation Shiloh Resort and Casino.

As an Environmental Protection Specialist, I would hope that officials such as yourself and indeed the entire BIA, be in the interest of maintaining Tribal sovereignty as a matter of the utmost respect, regard and consideration. Allowing a Nation with no historical or federally recognized ties to establish gaming rights within another Tribe's established homeland inherently pits Indigenous peoples against one another and denies the right to sovereignty Native people have fought so hard to obtain post-colonization. It also sends a message to our Tribe that the BIA does not support our best interests.



- The project would subvert the County of Sonoma's zoning plan and commitment to residents to preserve open space and agricultural use.
- The EIS does not assess the project's potential increase of need for law enforcement and emergency services or address the capacity of local agencies to supply services. In this county area outside city limits, we don't even have patrol. The county law enforcement does not enforce traffic, and we have only the CHP, whose cars are on the freeway rather than on our two-lane roads. "Proposing to enter into a contract" for law enforcement and emergency services is not meaningful.
- The proposals concerning restriping pavement don't address the inadequacy of the width of the roads to add lanes.
- No amount of disaster preparedness is going to change the fact that there aren't enough roads to evacuate the increased population of the proposed projects.
- "The use of BMPs would minimize impacts...no mitigation required", repeated seems facile. The practices are not defined or described. No one who lives in the neighborhood believes that any version of this project would be insignificant.

This letter is in response to the Environmental Impact Statement published on July 12, 2024 concerning the fee-to-trust application and proposed development of the 68 acre property located on the southeast corner of Old Redwood Highway and E. Shiloh Road by the Koi Tribe. I have reviewed it and feel strongly that it has not addressed the many conflicts and problems this project will cause.

I, like so many residents are opposed to this project for many reasons. The location of the hotel, casino and concert center will require significant amount of resources. The mass amount of water usage will require a new deep well as well as a massive wastewater treatment facility.

This along with all the parking needed for these venues is just misplaced and inappropriate for a predominately residential and agricultural area. It is also poorly located from a traffic and potential evacuation route.

As a resident living nearby who had to evacuate my home at a moments notice in 2017 and 2020 due to an oncoming wildfire, I know first hand how important it is to have as many evacuation routes as possible in the likely event of another wild fire in our area. This large complex right in the middle of so many family neighborhoods with 2 lane roads will be completely inadequate and very dangerous in the case of an evacutation. The surrounding roads simply cannot support a largescale evacuation in an effective and safe manner.

Our county water resources are decreasing every year and should be prioritized for its existing needs particularly for agricultural and residents. To propose a new well and water treatment plant just for this project is excessive and will very likely result in the drawdown on the existing shallower wells that residents and farms or ranches surrounding that area depend on.

As Sonoma County residents we already have multiple choices for gaming and entertainment. For a county to house three different casinos is excessive when there are so many other critical needs to be addressed. The negative effects far outweight the positives. Please consider my objection to this misplaced project.

I have lived in the Town of Windsor for 28 years, approximately 3 miles from the proposed Koi Shiloh Resort project. This letter is to once again voice my extreme opposition to this project, which would destroy the quality of life and safety in our town. In addition to the quality of life concerns in this proposed residential area such as traffic and noise as well as environmental impacts, I would like to emphasize the following two serious safety concerns.

- Wildfire Evacuation I have lived through the evacuations of both the Tubbs Fire and the Kincade Fire and know first-hand how dangerous this situation is. We live in an area surrounded by extreme, very high and high wildfire risk. This project would replace the vineyard, which is a natural fire break, with a casino, hotel, spa, event center that would increase the fire risk. We are aware that another wildfire in our area is when, not if, and we know the tragic consequences of inadequate evacuation routes from the Paradise Fire and the Maui Fire. Adding a project of this size to our already stressed two lane roads would very likely cause gridlock and a real potential for loss of life robbing us of our peace of mind and will cause constant fear for our safety in our own homes. The EIS is faulty in the assumption that we will have adequate warning to evacuate the casino property prior to safely evacuating the Town of Windsor.
- Crime The proposed mitigation to address this issue by staffing up the police department in response to the increased crime is not acceptable. The proposed location of the casino project is right across the street from neighborhoods with families and retired people. The knowledge that police are available to respond after a dui accident or worse occurs will not alleviate the impact and fear of these crimes in our community.

It appears that the only supporters of this project do not live in this area and only wish to profit financially. As for the claim that it will create many new jobs, the unemployment rate in this area is very low with many help wanted signs in local businesses. The proposed site is not in a commercial area. It is in an agricultural, residential area where families and retired live, children go to school and play in the park, wildlife live, and we all enjoy the incredible natural beauty of this area. The proposed location is absolutely **not** the right location for this project.

Hello, my name is Sandra Pinola, I am a member of the Kashaya Band of Pomo Indians, located in Stewarts Point Sonoma County, CA and I have lived in the Town of Windsor for 32 years.

On April 5 2022, the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution opposing the attempt to take **222 East Shiloh Road, Sant Rosa, CA** into trust land for the Koi Nation. My tribe the Kashaya Band of Pomo Indians also adopted and submitted a Tribal Resolution to oppose this project along with four other tribes.

I am opposed to this project for the following reasons:

First and foremost, **this is Not their ancestral territory,** they are from Lake County, CA. The BIA should not approve this!

Second, they currently have a lawsuit against the **City of Clearlake,CA**. The Koi Nation maintained that the City Clearlake improperly filed for CEQA exemption status on a city project.

And are irreparably harming the Koi Nation, it's ancestors and its cultural artifacts which are potentially eligible for the California Register of Historic Resources, archaeological site CCL-21-01.

As such, the Koi Nation cannot have it both ways. If there is proof of their ancestors are already documented in Clearlake, CA then that would show that SONOMA COUNTY is not their territory and never has been.

If this land is taken into trust for Koi Nation it will be in grave error.

I am writing regarding the Koi Shiloh Casino Project. We have raised our family in the neighborhood directly across the street from the proposed site. We have lived here for 27 years.

It is very alarming that the Koi Nation would choose a residential property on a quiet country road. As I am sure you are aware, not only is the property surrounded by neighborhoods, but by a church, youth park and baseball field, as well as an elementary school. This is not the right spot for a large casino project.

I believe that the EIS 2022 TIS traffic data is now too old to be used for this EIS analysis for the following reasons. First, 2022 was not that long after the Covid pandemic, during which many local businesses were still encouraging/allowing work from home. This decreased the 2022 daily trips throughout this region of Sonoma County, however now (2024) traffic has returned to pre-pandemic levels and probably higher.

In addition, did the TIS traffic counts take into consideration the new construction developments on both Shiloh Road and Old Redwood Highway? The biggest of these new developments is the Shiloh Crossing Apartment development located at 295 Shiloh Road. The project includes a total of 173 apartments and 8,000 square feet of commercial space.

The ADT counts were taken in July of 2022. This is a season when schools are not in session, nor are many after-school activities. Cars typically line up and down Shiloh Road, when sports are happening in Esposti Park. A better peak time for ADT counts would have been in April or September of a given year.

Therefore, I request that the EIS perform a new TIS which includes recent traffic counts and incorporates expected new developments within the project study area. I believe new traffic counts will more accurately represent this area and show that this is not a viable location for a casino. We would ask that further studies are done. 


New 5-Story Parking Structure Unveiled At Graton Resort & Casino

Everyone else I know was stuck in traffic. My friends house up in the Shiloh estates - she stayed and was fighting the fire with her hose until the firefighters arrived. That is right above where the casino would be. Our house had massive smoke damage and we were out of our home for 2 months. You are not being realistic to think that adding 5,000 cars wouldn't cause a problem in our fire zone county. Face us residents in person. Let us tell you our fire stories. I have 30 friends who lost homes in the fires. They lost everything. Every single thing except their lives as they fled with seconds left. They lost pets and generations of personal items, cars and jewelry. This is absolutely irresponsible for the BIA and the KOI who are non-native to our town and our community.

My husband and I are residents of Sonoma County and I am writing with regard to the proposed Koi Nation Resort and Casino Project. We are both strongly opposed to this effort, for two main reasons.

First, and I think most importantly, the land on which this development is proposed is not traditional Koi land. It is land within the area recognized as belonging historically to our neighbors, the tribes of Graton Rancheria. I would therefor think that the Koi have no claim to purchase land there, certainly without the permission and support of Graton Rancheria. And from what I have read they have no such permission and in fact Graton Rancheria is rightfully strongly opposed to this plan. If the Koi are allowed to proceed with this effort, then what is to prevent any tribe from encroaching on another tribe's territory? How does this impact the tribal integrity of ALL native people? If Graton Rancheria wanted to do something like this on Koi land I think you would find that the Koi would not be so pleased with that.

I understand that a casino/resort would provide potentially substantial income for the Koi. And I am certainly sensitive to the need for tribes to strengthen their financial positions. However, I don't think encroaching on another tribe's land AND doing so in a way that competes directly financially with that tribe's existing casino (and so reduces money they have available to support THEIR community) is a defensible approach.

In addition, the area in which the project is proposed is imminently unsuited for this this level of development. Much of the parcel is bounded by residential areas. The noise level associated with the increase in traffic will be quite substantial, as well as the general disruption in people's lives due to the increased traffic. Old Redwood Highway is basically a local road, not a four lane super highway for the kind of traffic this would produce. Could the road be widened? Yes, of course it could. But you would still have a problem with the fact that during fire evacuations getting to 101 is the fastest route out of danger in that area. And only Shiloh and Airport Boulevard access that. Think about adding several thousand casino guests and employees to the chaos and you have put a substantial number of people, including residential neighbors, at risk for their lives.

Having lived through the Tubbs fire and the evacuation that ensued during that time we feel like it would be difficult and dangerous to have to do an evacuation with a casino in our neighborhood. The roads simply could not accommodate a mass evacuation, they are already compromised with traffic now that new apartment structures have been built at Shiloh Road and Old Redwood Highway.

Another issue is the amount of water that will be used for a resort and casino this size. We already have restrictions and not enough water in our neighborhood during drought years. Putting out even small fires requires ample use of water not to mention all the new construction in our neighborhoods for housing and businesses depleating our water supply.

The Graton Resort and Casino is a mere 12 - 15 minute drive. That area has completely been transformed since the Casino was opened. 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Mr. Broussard:

By way of introduction, I am a resident of Windsor and my wife has been a vocal advocate opposing the approval by the BIA of the proposed Casino by the Koi Tribe of the Pomo Indians in Windsor I am sure you are aware is most definitely not their tribal homeland - but I leave that to others to discuss. My wife and others who as Windsor residents (particularly those most affected on the east side of Highway 101) have spent hundreds of hours working to impress upon the BIA the dangers that would be presented by this project to those thousand upon thousands of residents in Windsor and northern Santa Rosa. I have finally had a chance to read some - but not all of the EIS and I believe most of these potential impacts are raised and acknowledged to be true environmental impacts by the authors of the EIS. Originally my biggest concern about the EIS process was that the EIS was drafted by a company that apparently has significant past ties (and potential future business) with the Chickasaw Nation regarding that tribe's efforts to increase the number of Casinos across the country. And I still believe that the majority of impacts identified in the EIS have been classified by Acorn Engineering as not having Significant Impact, without much consideration given to the real life ramifications of the impacts on the community (as opposed to the impacts on the Casino site itself). But Ultimately, what is most significant is the final conclusion of the EIS as to the "Environmentally Preferable Alternative" project for the site under the Code of Federal Regulations (40 CFR 1502.14(f)). I am sure you fully understand this provision of the Code which requires the author of the EIS to make a recommendation based on comparison of the environmental impacts identified for the various alternatives. As set forth in the Code:

The alternatives section is the heart of the environmental impact statement. The alternatives section should identify the reasonably foreseeable environmental effects of the proposed action and the alternatives in comparative form based on the information and analysis presented in the sections on the affected environment (§ 1502.15) and the environmental consequences (§ 1502.16). In doing so, the analysis should sharply define the issues for the decision maker and the public and provide a clear basis for choice among options. In this section, agencies shall:

(f)

Identify the environmentally preferable alternative or alternatives amongst the alternatives considered in the environmental impact statement. The environmentally preferable alternative will best promote the national environmental policy expressed in section 101 of NEPA by maximizing environmental benefits, such as addressing climate change-related effects or disproportionate and adverse effects on communities with environmental justice concerns; protecting, preserving, or enhancing historic, cultural, Tribal, and natural resources, including rights of Tribal Nations that have been reserved through treaties, statutes, or Executive Orders; or causing the least damage to the biological and physical environment. The environmentally preferable alternative may be the proposed action, the no action alternative, or a reasonable alternative.

It is worth noting that there were only two "beneficial impacts" identified by the EIS, one being the Effects to the Tribe, which they note "would allow the Tribe to generate revenues to fund tribal services." There is no indication or evidence of what services the Koi nation provides to its fewer than 100 members. And the completely speculative Economy/Employment benefit to an amorphous community (in no way discussing how the affected location would benefit), in which "construction and operation of the project alternatives could impact spending and labor demand in the region. Construction and operation of the project alternatives could impact wages, job availability, and/or employment rates." Based on comments raised at the Zoom meeting, primarily by members of the Northern California Carpenters Union, presumably there would be some number of jobs for union members during construction (in those comments, none of those union members claimed to be residents of Windsor and only one identified his home as unincorporated Santa Rosa. And presumably there would be other jobs available but no indication of evidence that any of those jobs would be taken by Windsor or even Sonoma County residents where the biggest employment issue for many small businesses is finding people to fill job openings. Compare that with more than 80 negative impacts, whether deigned by Acorn Environmental to be Less than Significant (without other than speculative explanation) or Significant (with speculative analysis of the mitigation that could render them potentially less significant.

I urge you to take the recommendation of the EIS and find for Alternative D as identified by the EIS.

I attended the virtual meeting on the EIS but could not stay long enough to raise my comment. I am a resident of Windsor and have several deep concerns that I did not hear in the meeting.

1. The town of Windsor is a small (26,000 person) town, which is special in that it is a "regular" town with residents, instead of a primarily tourist area which is what a lot of towns in Sonoma county have turned into. Our residents consist of a lot of families, regular wage earners. We have our town green with twice weekly events all summer, farmer's markets, and so many other community building events at local parks and schools.

When guests come to the proposed casino, they would not just be coming to the casino itself but they would also come to visit the surrounding area. The sheer volume of guests would overwhelm our small town, removing access for residents to the community building events and displacing residents from being able to park and access our small number of amenities.

- 2. My second concern is due to the increase of environmental heat generated by removing upwards of 50% of the existing vineyard and soil, which of course combats global and local warming and helps with carbon sequestration by the plants. I am a Tribal Citizen of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria and former Cultural Monitor for the Tribe. The purpose of this letter is to express my personal opposition to the Koi Nation of Northern California's project to establish trust land for gaming in Sonoma County, California, more specifically on Shiloh Road in Windsor, California

As a previous Cultural Monitor and current member of the Sacred Sites Protection Committee for Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria I feel I have a somewhat unique personal view of the situation. I have monitored in this area, sometimes as a result of major fires that have decimated the area, of which fire is only one of many other major concerns. What concerns me the most is that Koi Nation claims this area as their ancestral territory. This is not their ancestral territory, their territory is in Lake County. Our tribe is notified when ancestral cultural items or human remains are found in our territory. Koi Nation is not on the notification list when there is a potential exposure involved in cultural sites in this area. I feel disrespected as a tribal member of the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria that Koi Nation feels this is their territory. We as a tribe have even shared areas of monitoring with respect to other tribes when that is applicable, not here with Koi Nation.

The DOI is supposed to protect tribal sovereignty and this precedent setting proposal by the Koi Nation is actually undoing tribal sovereignty.

I support the right of all tribes to restore their homelands and pursue gaming on those lands. I do not have an issue with the Koi Nation locating a casino in Lake County, their ancestral territory.

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Hello Chris,

My wife and I lost our home of 30 years in the Tubbs fire of 2017- we were one of 5000 homes lost in that conflagration.. Needless to say we are hypersensitive to the prospects of another such wildfire in our area. The Kincaide fire of 2019 was another major fire in the same area. Bringing thousands of vehicles onto the back roads around the casino area will certainly increase the risk of starting another major fire. Many of your patrons will be smokers and as a group smokers are not considered the most careful folks when it relates to caution with matches and cigarette butts. Ninety-five percent of all wildfires in the U.S. are human caused and a good portion of those are due to improper disposal of cigarette butts. Possibly you could mitigate the problem by admitting only non-smokers to your casino.

As a long time volunteer of Shiloh Regional Park, a park of 840 acres located immediately across Faught Road from the proposed Koi Casino, I am concerned about the negative impacts the casino will have on the park. Shiloh Regional Park is the only one of our 56 parks which does not allow dogs in the park. This restriction is because this park is located in a rather secluded section of the county and is intended to provide a sanctuary for wildlife. Many mammals including deer, bobcats, coyotes, racoon, skunks and a great variety of rodents and even an occasional mountain Lion have been observed in the park. As a bird watcher I am impressed with the variety of birds one can see in the park. Over a years time, I have personally observed 86 species of birds at the Shiloh Regional park. There is also a desire to provide hikers and others using the park a modicum of tranquility and respite. To that end locals have dedicated 56 benches and picnic tables at scenic or special areas for the enjoyment of visitors- each of these require a \$5000.00 donation to the parks foundation. A mega casino with a parking garage of 5000 spaces located immediately across the road from the park is hardly compatible with the intended purpose of this park, the increase traffic noises, the lights from the casino, the hotel and garage and the influx of many many folks will literally destroy the major attractions of this beautiful county park. There is no way you can mitigate these many negative impacts from this proposed casino.

Dear Regional Director Dutschke:

I am responding to the Draft Environmental Impact Statement that was prepared by the Bureau of Indian Affairs for the Koi Nation Shiloh Resort Casino Project in May 2024.

The DEIS uses the words "short term inconveniences", short-term disturbances", and "short term disruptions" to describe unmitigated impacts to my family's and neighbors' environment. Other ambiguous phrases like "not expected" and "not anticipated" are used to downplay the potential impacts. Who will monitor and regulate all of the mitigating factors described in the report? And who decides what "short-term" means? There has been non-stop construction within a half-mile of the proposed resort since ground breaking on the Esposti Park Apartments several years ago.

Despite the data collected within the DEIS, if the resort casino is approved to be built, traffic and roadway changes on Shiloh Road and Old Redwood Highway **will** become long-term and will continue to significantly impact lives of the community residents, businesses, schools, and churches.

At this moment, within one-half mile of the proposed resort casino, there is over 300 multi-family housing units under construction, a planned 175-unit senior living and memory care facility, and 32,000 square feet of commercial development underway or planned. Amidst this rapid growth, the lone remaining parcel of open greenbelt space where Old Redwood Highway and East Shiloh Road intersect is now the subject of the largest Resort Casino in California. While abrupt, this growth facilitates a socioeconomic need for housing and fits within both the Town of Windsor's and County of Sonoma's general plans. Adding a resort casino does not fit. The Windsor plan encourages land use that facilitates walking and biking, while the county plan facilitates a greenbelt between Santa Rosa and Windsor so we don't end up like San Jose. Funneling 30,000 cars per day to a resort in this neighborhood is a disregard to the community and its long term plans. The last two wildfire evacuations were unbearable. Adding resort casino traffic will put lives at risk.

As noted by virtually every local elected official, the location of the proposed resort casino is not appropriate and far outside the plans for this area irrespective of the poorly prepared DEIS.

The only option I can support is Option D, no resort casino.
